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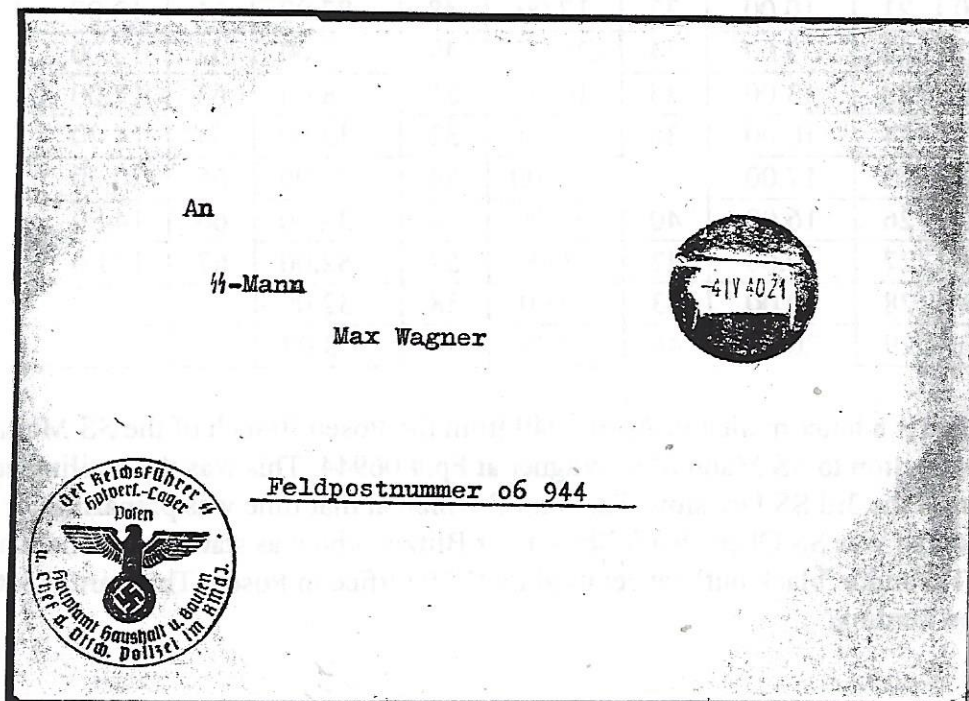
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# STUDY GROUP NOTES

**Card Marking** – Does anyone know what the circular ‘eagle’? marking on this parcel card represents? Where was it applied and by whom? While addressee is at an army training battalion, there doesn’t seem to be a reason why it would use an elaborate receiving mark, especially when it is undated. This card came from a German auction. It was illustrated but no explanation was given for the marking. Please send any info to our Bulletin Editor. *Submitted by Ben Beede.*

**Mystery Kenn Number** – in response to the article in Bulletin 153, Martin Lynes informs us that Klaus Böhm’s ‘*Kenn-Nummern der Feldpostämter 1939-45*’ lists K-756 as used by FpA 99 (Fp. # 47130) on the following dates: 02.’41 in Bamberg; 02.’41 to 05.’41 in WKXIII; 06.’41 in Poland; 07.’41 to 11.’41 in South Russia; and 11.’41 to 06.5.’42 in WKXIII. We’ll review Herr Böhm’s Feldpost book in an upcoming Bulletin.

**Cover Illustration** is a letter mailed in April 1940 from the Posen Branch of the SS Main Office for Budget and Construction to SS Mann Max Wagner at Fp.# 06944. This was the mailing address of the Signals Battalion of the 3rd SS Division ‘Totenkopf’ which at that time was preparing for the invasion of France. The sender was SS Oberscharfsführer Fritz Blitzer who was stationed at the main supply depot in Posen. The mute ‘black out’ cancel used by DDP Office in Posen. This card is lot 22 in TRSG Auction 97. 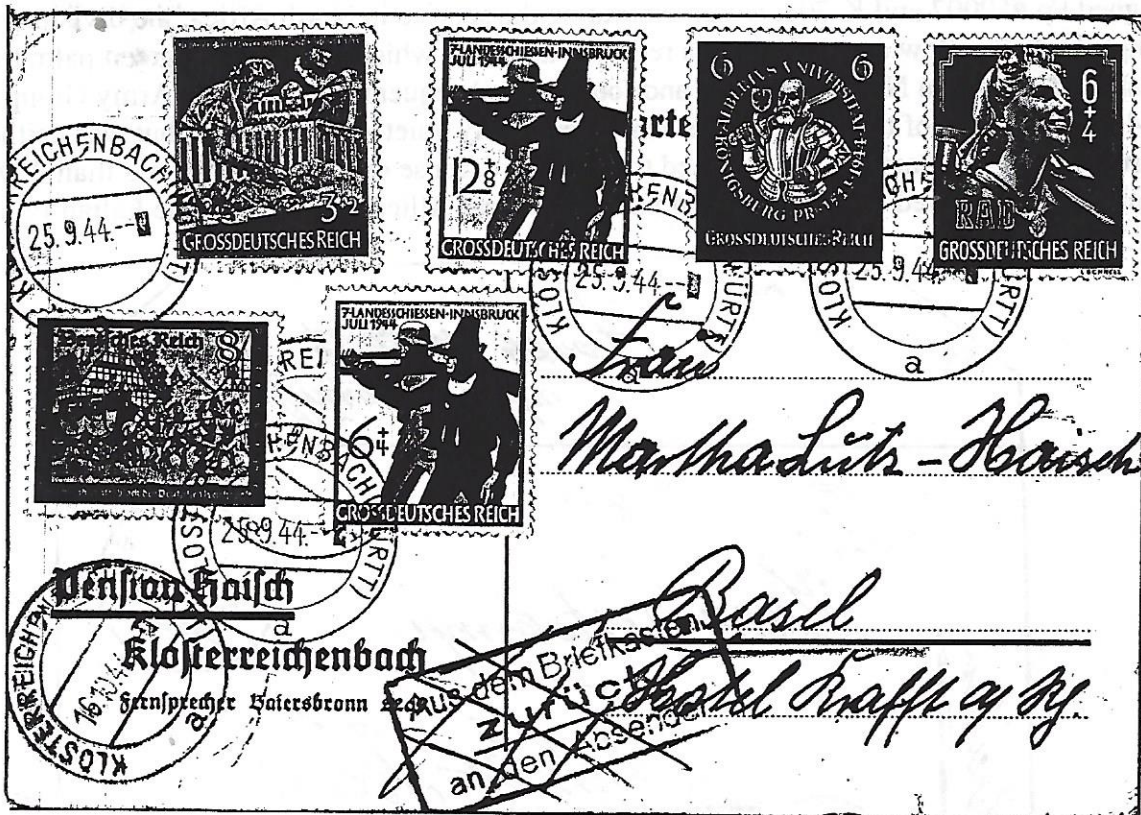
# Rejected by Censor - Inadmissible Mail

## Foreign Mail Posted in a Letter Box

Part II, Sec. 2A, Para. 6: "All letters to non-hostile foreign nations must be mailed at the post office counter."

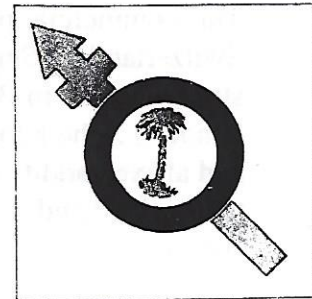
This commercial post card was sent from Klosterreichenbach (Wurttemberg) to Basil, Switzerland on September 25, 1944. The Munich censor office applied a boxed 3-line hand stamp "Aus dem Briefkasten/ zurück/an den Absender!" (From a Post Box/return/to Sender!) . The Klosterreichenbach Post Office apparently conducted the required review and affixed additional postage for the sender. The examiner's rejection hand stamp was then voided and the card canceled on October 16, 1944 per the postmark in lower left corner.



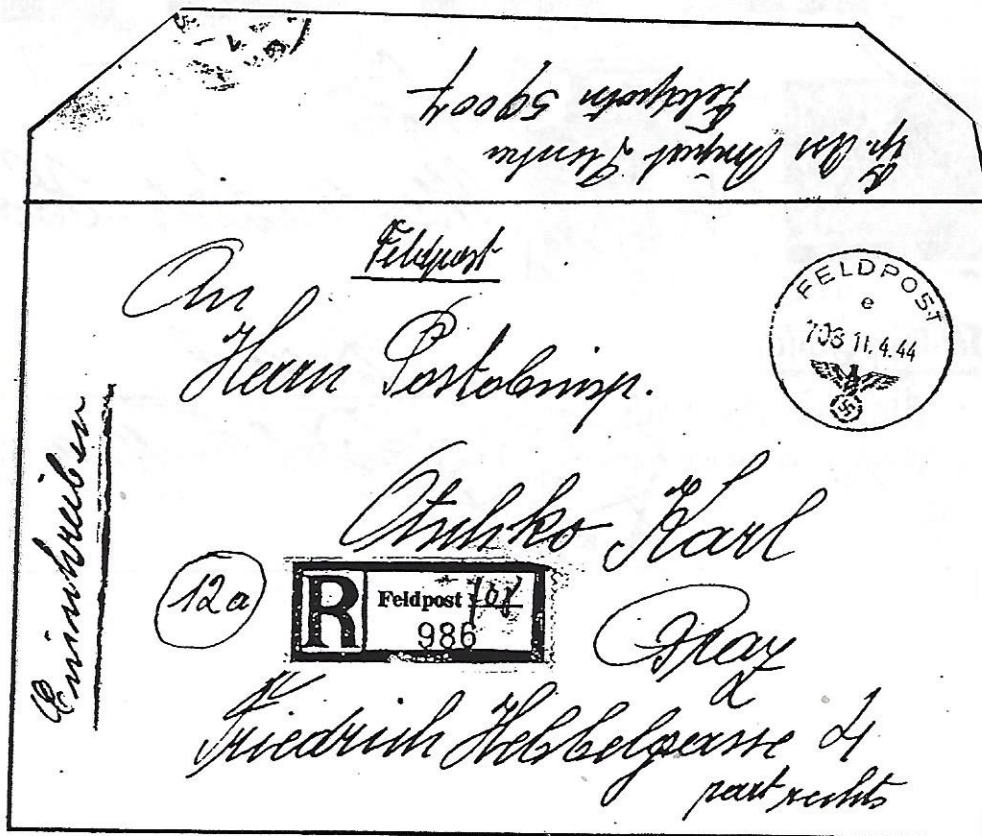
## COMBAT DIVISION PROFILE: 334th Infantry Division by Jim Lewis

Formed in the fall of 1942 as a composite division with regiments Raised in Military Districts XIII, XVII and XVIII. The P.O. was Assigned Fp.# 48115 and Kenn 412. Sent to North Africa in December 1942, the division fought well in the battle of Tunisian Bridgehead but was destroyed when Army Group Africa collapsed in May 1943.



The division was reformed in southern France during the summer of 1943 with personnel from Wehrkreis XIII. A new FpA 334 was assigned Fp.#59007 and K-708. Commemorating the service in North Africa, the division emblem was a single barbed yellow arrow through a red ring, inside of which is depicted a green palm tree. It was transferred to Italy in November 1943 and fought in subsequent campaigns of Army Group C. By May 1944 the remainder of the division was sent to relatively quiet Adriatic sector but was neither reinforced nor re-built. In February 1945 it returned to action in defense of Bologna with less than 2600 men. The division was destroyed on April 23, 1945 during the last Allied offensive on the Italian Front.

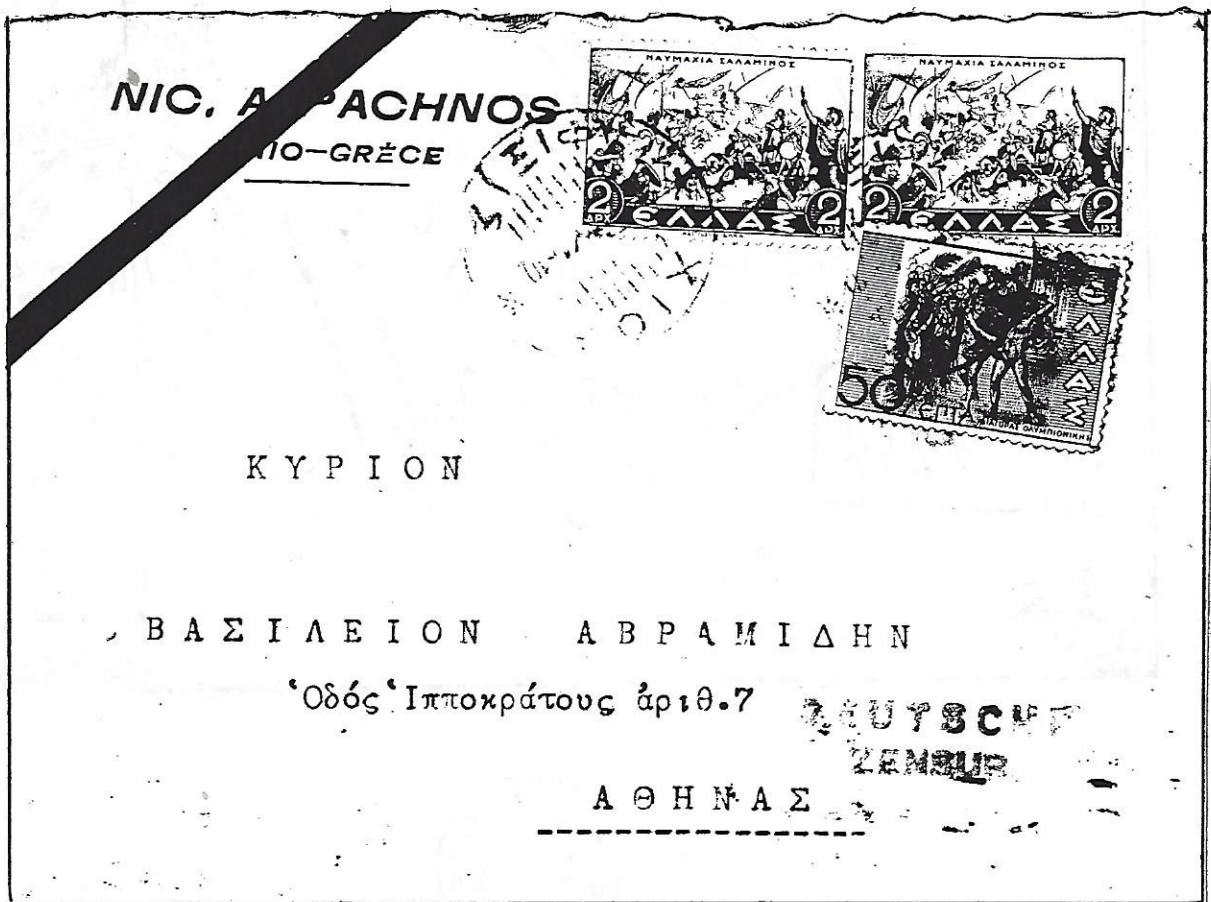
## Military Censor Stations in Occupied Regions

### Censorship Markings Employed in Greece

Until now our censorship articles has been about the surveillance by German authorities of private communications between countries. Mail internal to the countries was normally not controlled. This was even true for most of the so-called occupied regions. There are several exceptions to this internal control such as in Greece. Addition areas and will be the subject of future articles. These markings are quite scarce and often quite light in terms of illustrating covers. For this reason the markings are also shown below the illustrations.

Fig. 1) Two line hand stamp "DEUTSCHE ZENSUR" applied on Greek island of Chios in the summer of 1941.

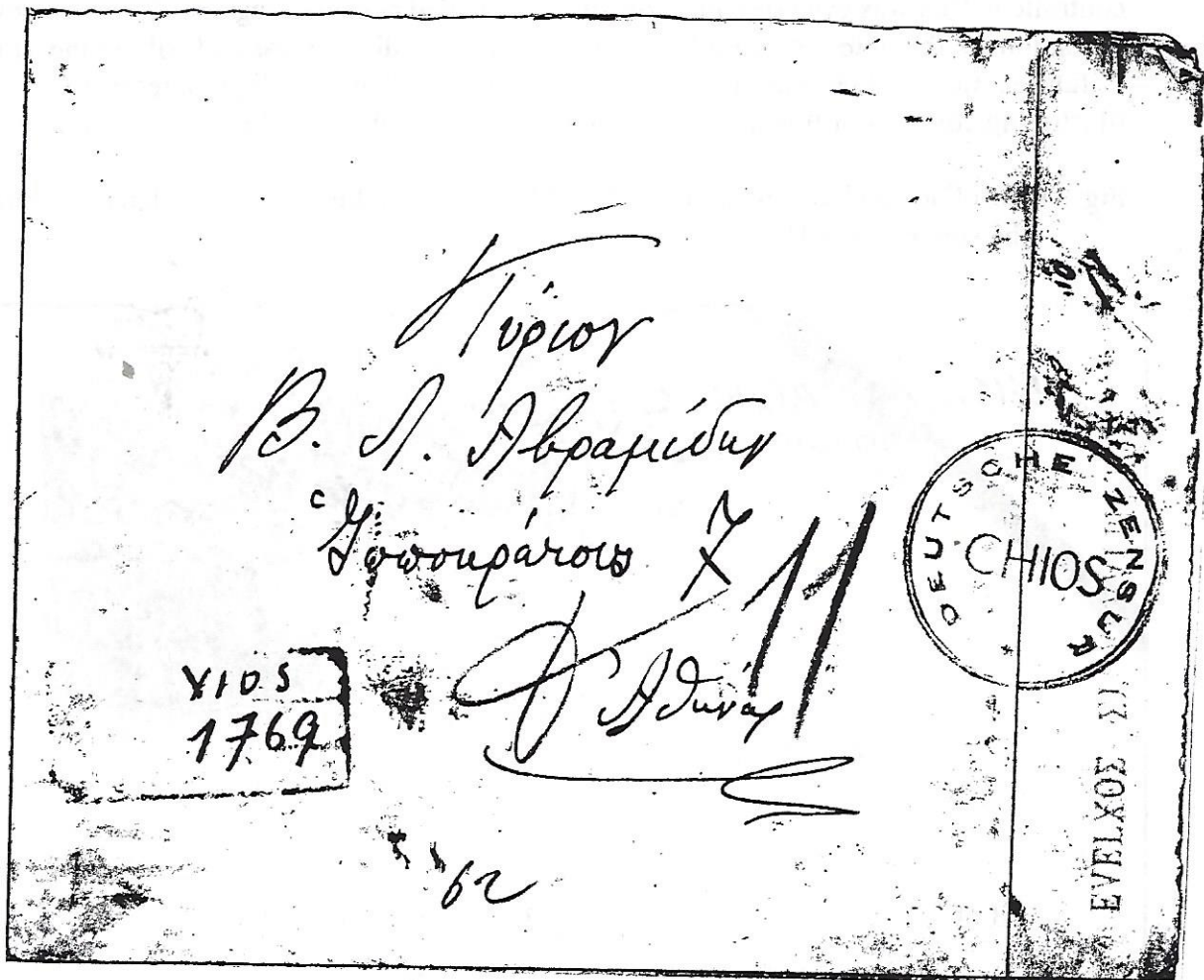
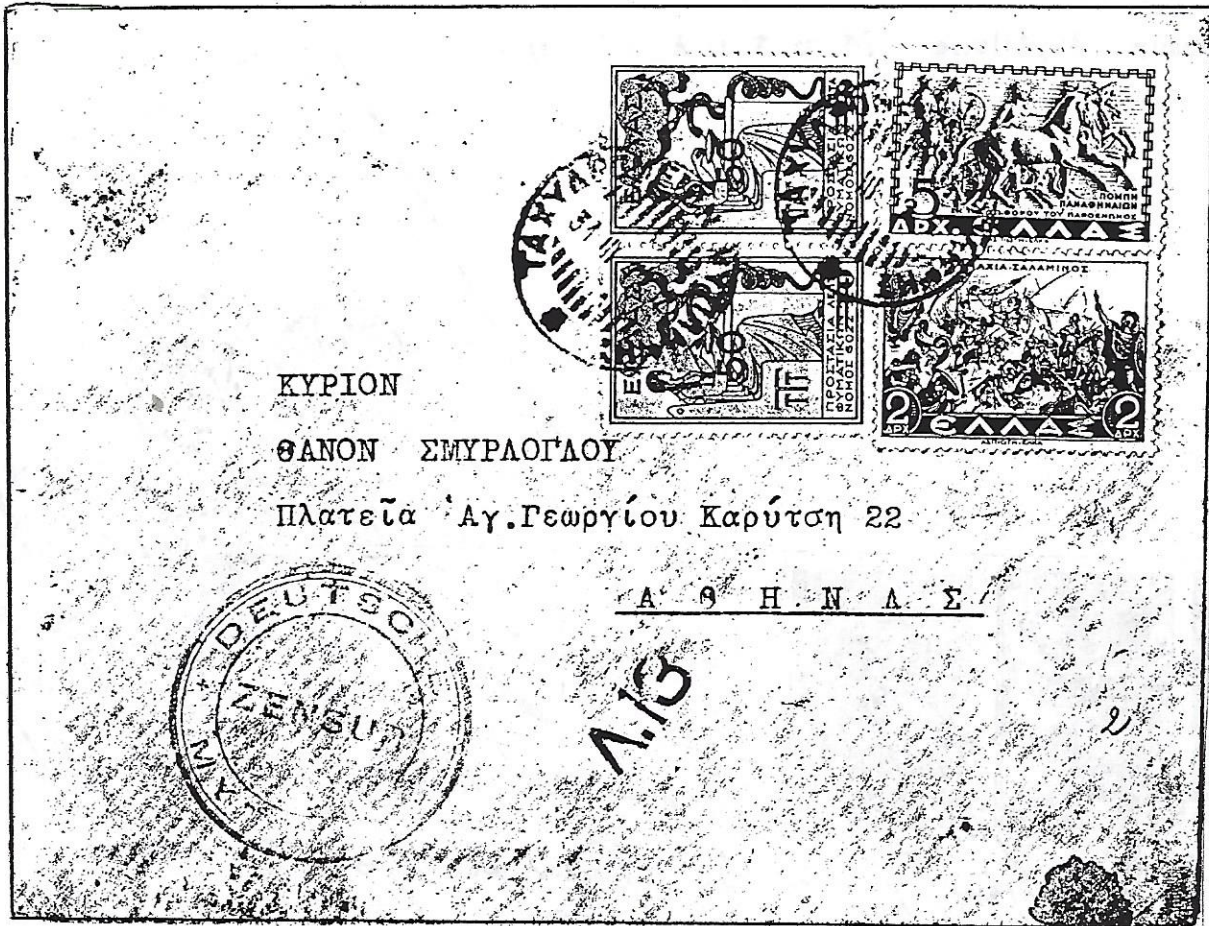








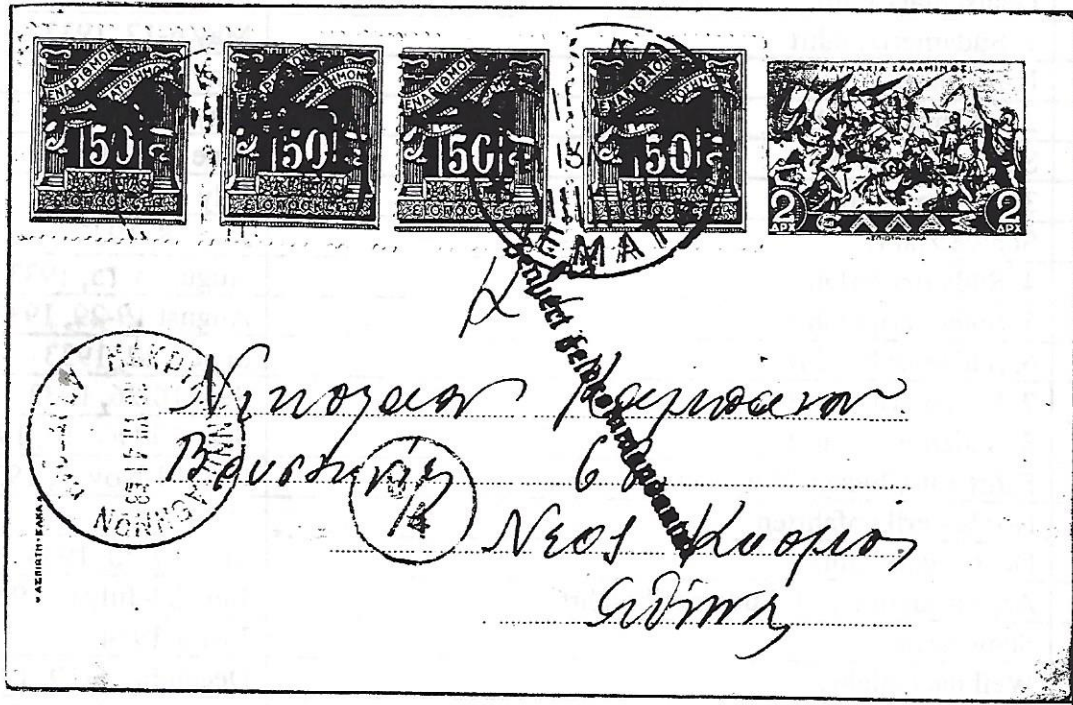
Fig. 4) Additional censor markings from Mytilene, capital of Greek island of Lesbos, used from 1942 to 1944 include a circular hand stamp with "DEUTSCHE MYTILENE" in outer ring and "ZENSUR" in center. The hand stamp of the examiner has the Greek letter "Lambda" and an Arabic numeral. The cover shown below has the hand stamp of examiner 13.

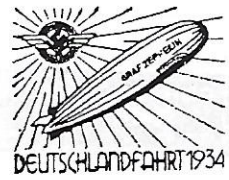
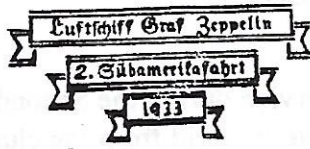

## Fundamentals of Feldpost Collecting

### Part 18. Legions of the Waffen-SS

The Germans were able to enlist many non-Germans into military service during the Second World War by creating the myth that Germany was fighting to save the western world from the clutches of Communism. Their propaganda convinced over one million foreigners to join the Wehrmacht (German Armed Forces). While most served in the Army without special attention, the SS formed National Legions to recruit and control the activities of those units formed by them. In addition to 125,000 from Western Europe, the SS also managed to enlist over 100,000 Baltic peoples into these national legions. It is interesting to observe that initially the French Legion was part of the Army until its transfer to the SS in 1943.

To raise funds for the special requirements of the Legions and to publicize their existence, special stamps were prepared for use by these organizations as labels on field post mail. The following are examples of mail to and from legionaries, many with the special stamps used as labels.

Fig. 1) Netherlands – air mail cover to Den Haag sent November 1942 with Feldpost cancel applied by Feldpostamt 789 (Kenn 411), which was serving Army Group Center in the Minsk area.





Fig. 2) Belgium (Flemish) – Cover sent in January 1942 to SS Rifleman in SS Replacement and Training Battalion Debica located near Cracow has legion labels and Feldpost cancels applied by Military Post Office for special purposes 732 (Kenn 451) located in Antwerp, Belgium

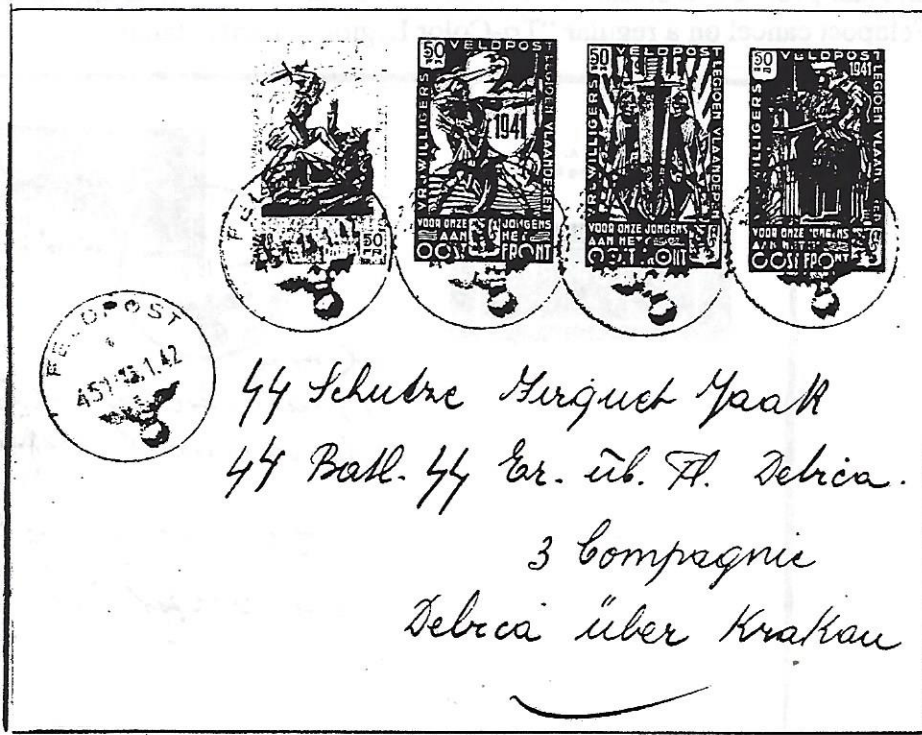


Fig. 3) Belgium (Walloon) – Cover sent to Antwerp in November 1942 from Fp. # 38918 (SS Freiwilligen Sturm Brigade Wallonien) has Legion Charities labels.





Fig. 4) France –French volunteers for the war against Bolshevism were initially controlled by the German Army. Late in 1942, France formed a “Tri-Color Legion” but upon German occupation of Vichy France, this unit was disbanded and merged with existing French formations. This unusual postcard addressed to German State Secretary Ahrens shows legitimate use of a German Feldpost cancel on a regular “Tri-Color Legion” charity stamp.

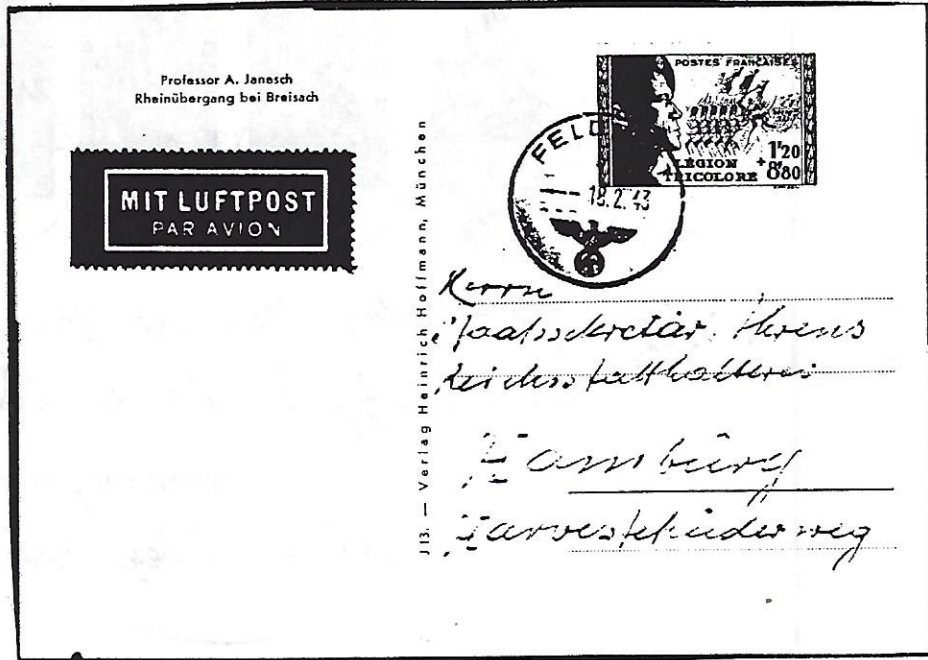


Fig. 5) France – All French volunteers were transferred to the Waffen-SS in 1943. A set of labels to raise funds for an earlier “French Legion Against Bolshevism” is shown on this 1944 Feldpost cover sent from France to the Propaganda Office of the Waffen-SS in Berlin.





Fig. 6) Norway – Letter from Norway sent in March 1944 to a Norwegian SS Volunteer at a military hospital in Alsace. The letter was re-routed by the postal clerk to Fp. # 09420, coded return address of Btl. III, SS Ausbildungs Lager Sennheim. All mail to foreign volunteers was censored by the SS Hauptamt in Berlin, which in this instance included a chemical test for hidden writing which left a diagonal blue streak from top left to bottom right.



Fig. 7) Croatia – Two divisions were formed from Croatian volunteers, the 7th SS Division 'Prinz Eugene' for Christian volunteers and the 13th SS-Division 'Handshar' for the Moslem members. Both divisions fought in Croatia. Below is a philatelic air mail cover sent in January 1945 from the Croatian SS Legion with semi-postal stamps with a surcharge for the relief of surviving family members of the SS.





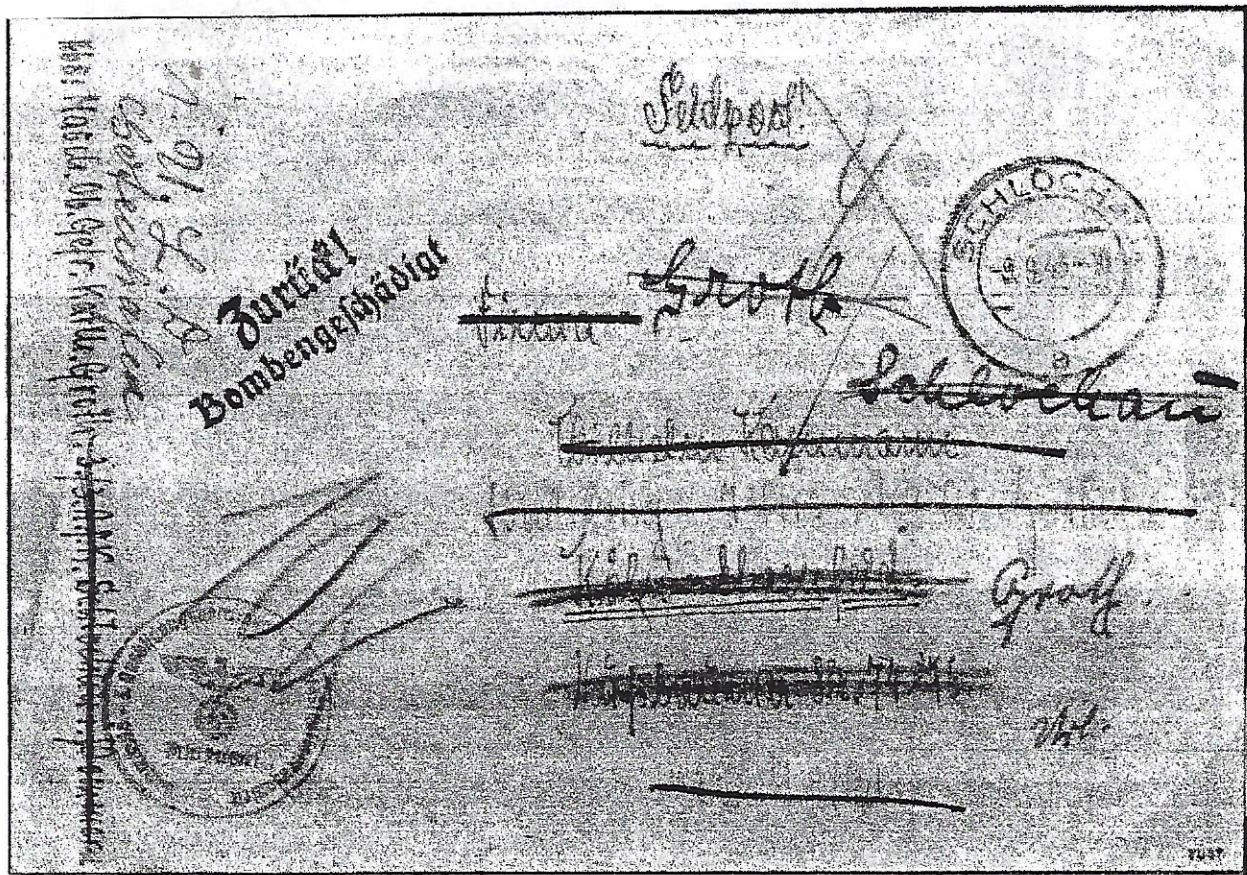
# Return - Bomb Damaged

RAF Bomber Command sent 247 aircraft against the city of Cologne on the night of July 8-9, 1943 where they dropped over a thousand tons of bombs, with a third of them incendiaries.

The Feldpost cover shown below was sent on September 9, 1943 from a member of the 3rd Training Unit for Warship Building in Schlochau to a commercial address in Cologne-Ehrenfeld.

The premises had been destroyed so the cachet '**Zurück!/Bombengeschädigt**' (Return!/Bomb Damaged) was struck by the post office before returning the letter to the sender, who had by then been transferred to the U-Boat Training Division at Götenhafen.





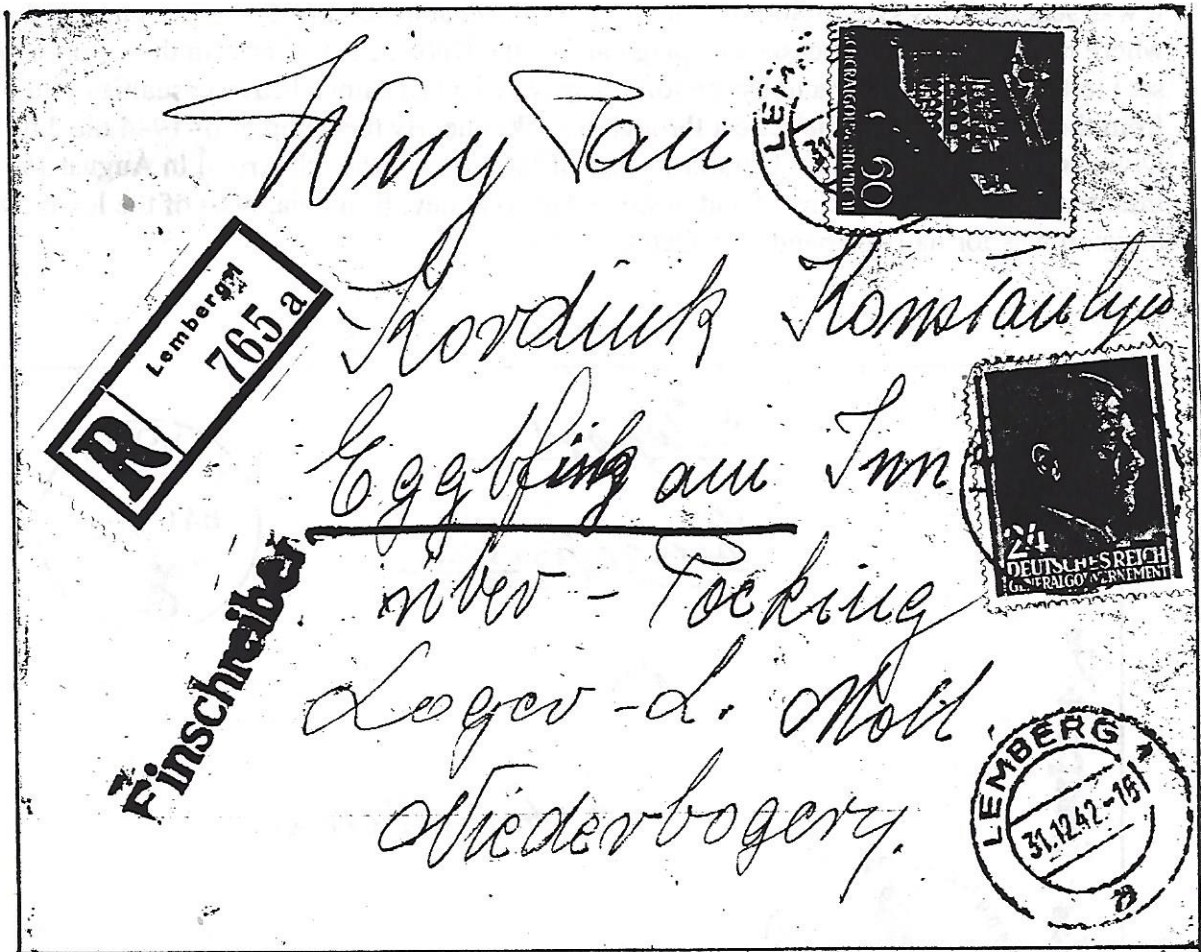
## Behind the Wire

### Letter from General Government to Slave Labor Camp

This registered cover was sent on December 31, 1942 from a Pole in Lemberg, Galacia to a person working in a cotton mill in Pocking, Bavaria. The addressee was one of over two million Polish workers who had been conscripted by Minister of Labor Sackel. Such workers were required to wear armbands designating them as 'Ostarbeiter' (Eastern workers).

The back stamp reveals that this letter took only two days to go from Eastern Poland (The German-occupied region known as the General Government) to Southern Germany.

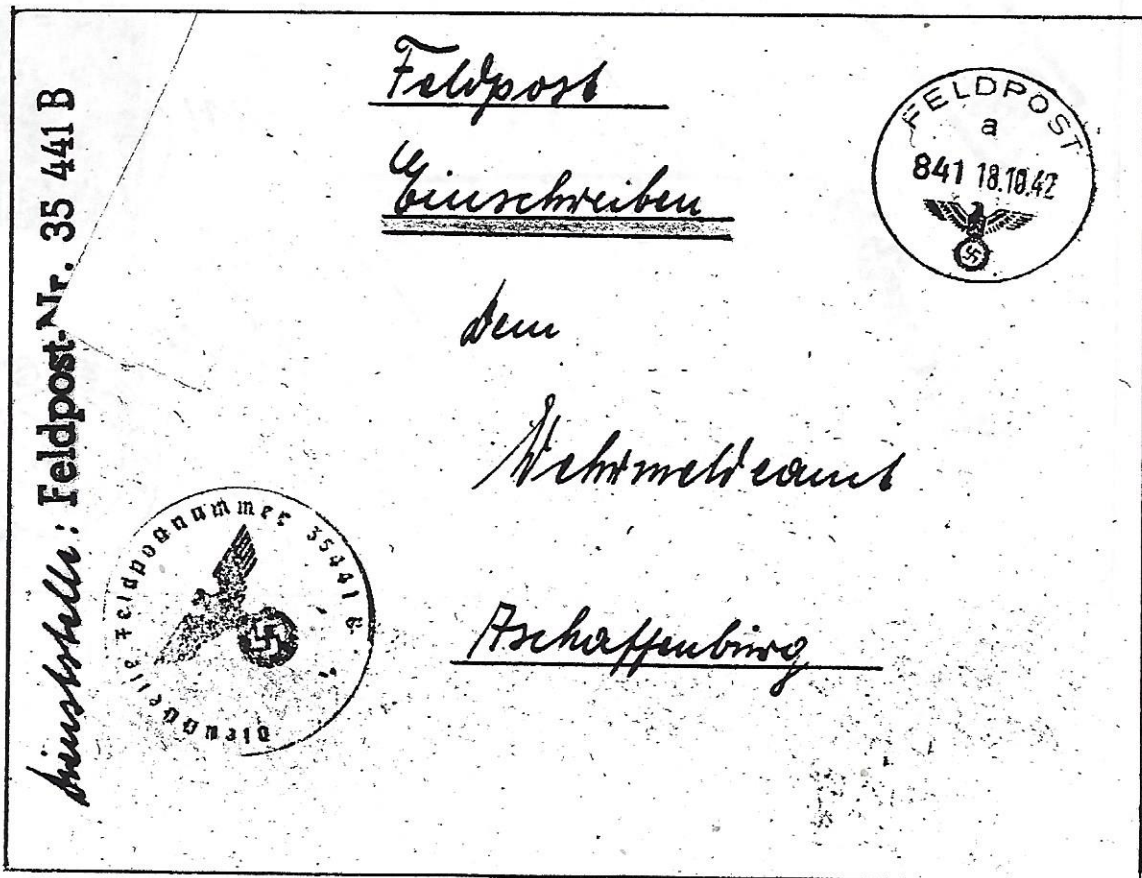

Formed near Reims, France in February 1942, the 370th Infantry Division P.O. was assigned Fp.# 29648 as a return address and K-841 for use on registered mail in lieu of tactical FpA 370.

It was sent to Army Group South on the Eastern Front at the completion of training in June 1942 where it fought in the Caucasus campaign and in the Kuban Bridgehead. In the autumn of 1943 it was sent to the lower Dneiper and by the following May had sustained heavy casualties in the withdrawal from the Dneiper and in the retreat through the Ukraine. By the summer of 1944 the 370th Infantry Division was in the southern Ukraine as part of IV Corps of the 6th Army. In August 1944 the 370th Infantry Division was encircled and destroyed at Kishinev, Romania, west of the lower Dneiper. The division was formally disbanded in October 1944.



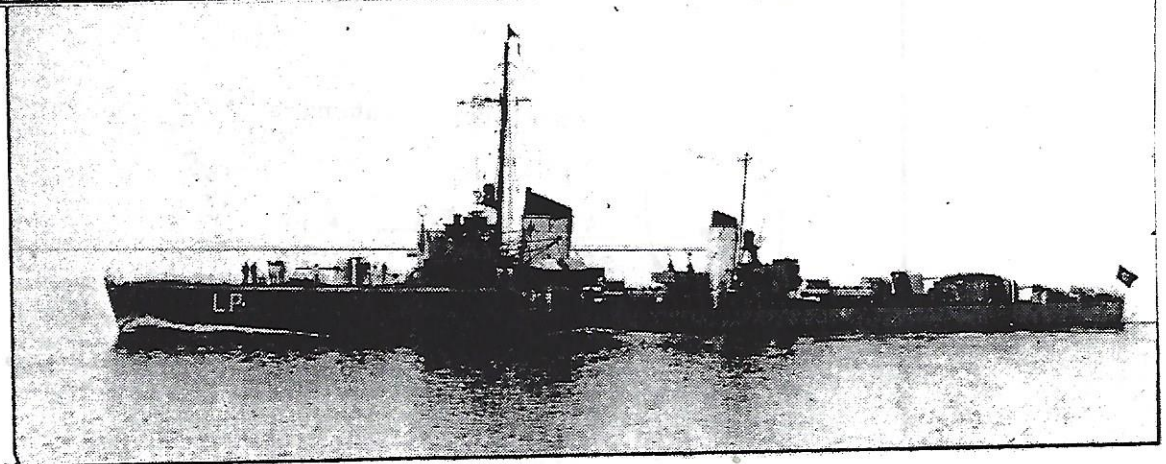
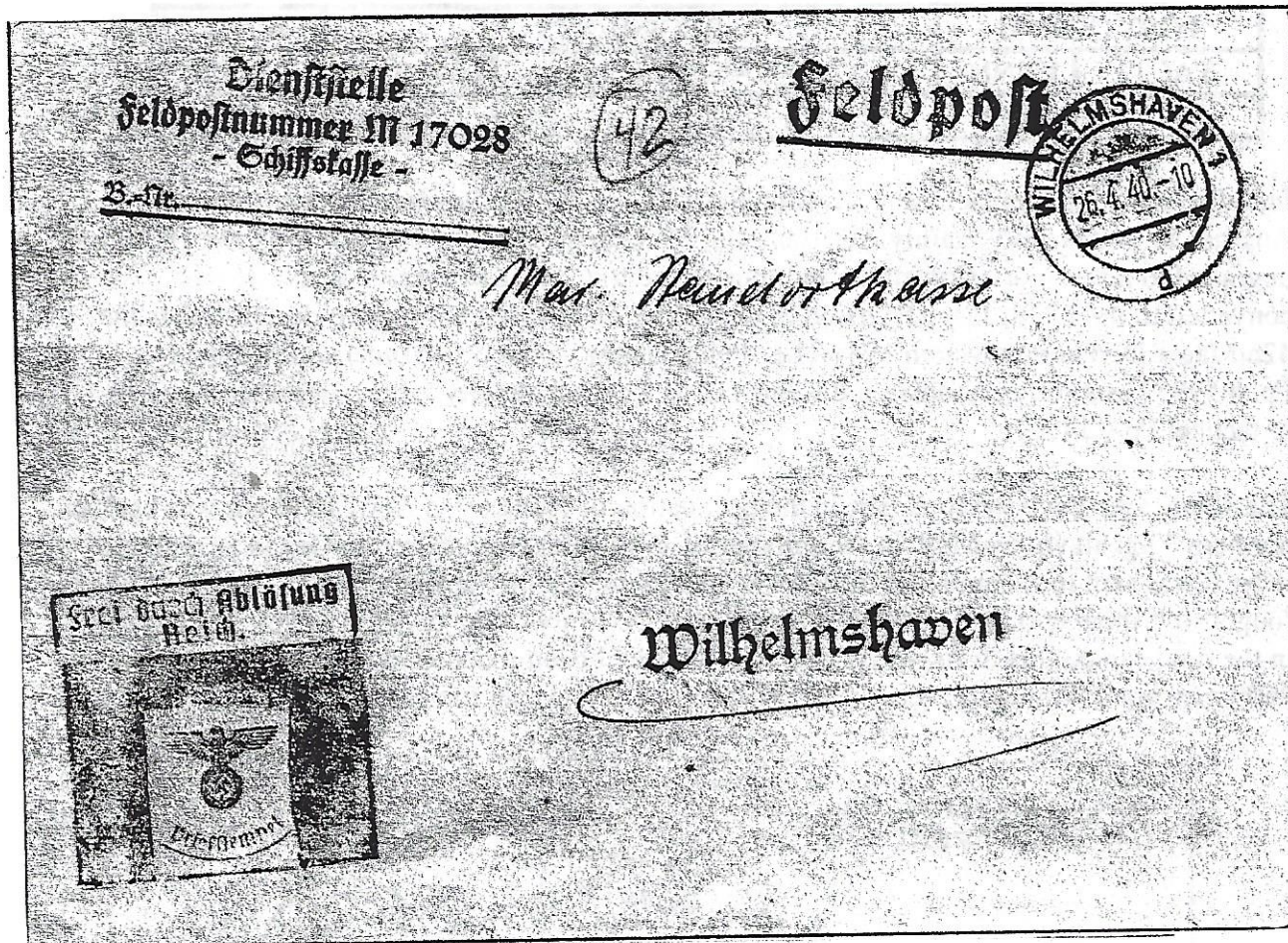

Torpedo Boat 'Leopard' - Feldpost # 17028



Torpedo boat type 1924 built by Naval Dockyard (Wilhelmshaven) and launched March 15, 1928. Displacement: 933 tons; speed: 33 knots; crew: 123; armament: three 5", two 20mm AA guns and six 21" torpedo tubes.

Saw action during invasion of Norway on April 7, 1940 and was lost during mine laying operation near Skaggerak on April 30, 1940. Cover above sent to Wilhelmshaven on April 26, 1940, four days before ship was lost.



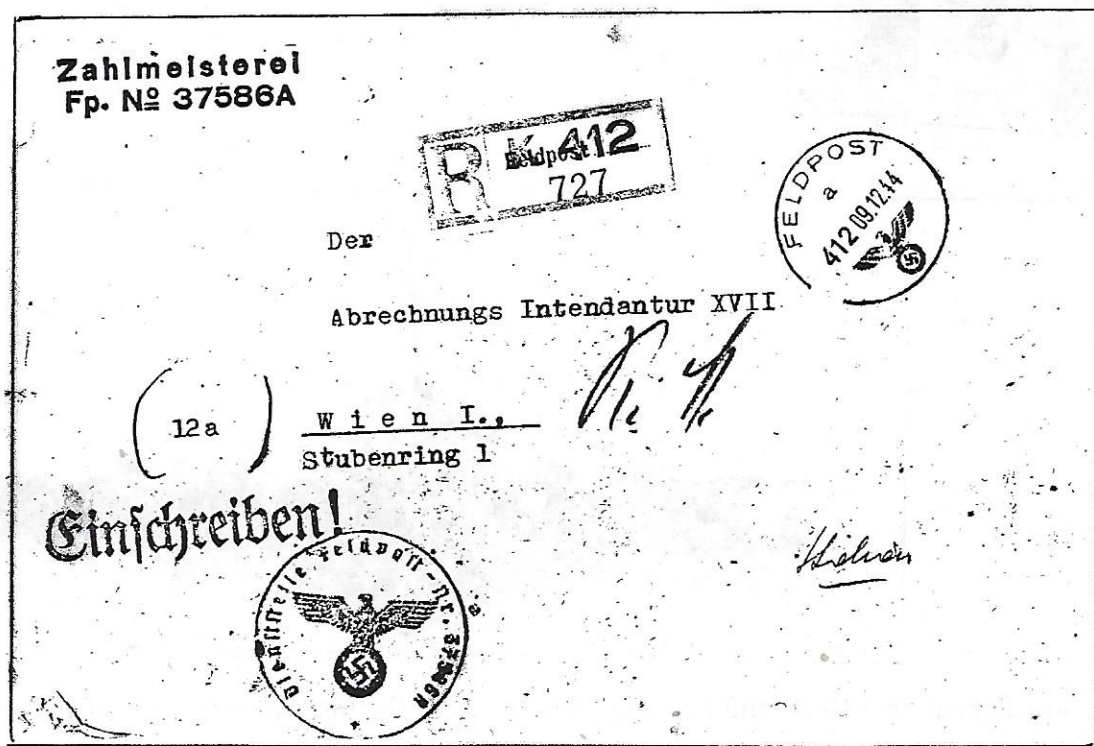

Initially formed as Replacement Division Staff 187 in 1938 following the annexation of Austria. Its troops were mainly Austrians and Volksdeutsche. In the fall of 1942 the 187th was upgraded to reserve division status and transferred to Croatia as a training unit. It was converted to the 187th Jäger Division in the winter of 1943-44 but then re-designated as the 42nd Jäger Division in March 1944. The "Feldpostamt" (post office unit) was assigned Fp. # 59937 as a return address and Kenn 412 as a coded identity for registered mail in lieu of tactical FpA 142.

The 42nd Jäger Division took part in the occupation of Hungary in April 1944 but was back in northern Yugoslavia by May. In the summer of 1944 it was transferred to Genoa in northern Italy. It was sent into combat in the Gothic Line campaign in September 1944. The division fought well there and in the Battle of Bologna in December. The division suffered heavy losses in the final campaigns in Italy. By March 1945 it had been reduced to a strength of less than 2600 men but continued to serve until capitulation of German forces in Italy in April 1945.

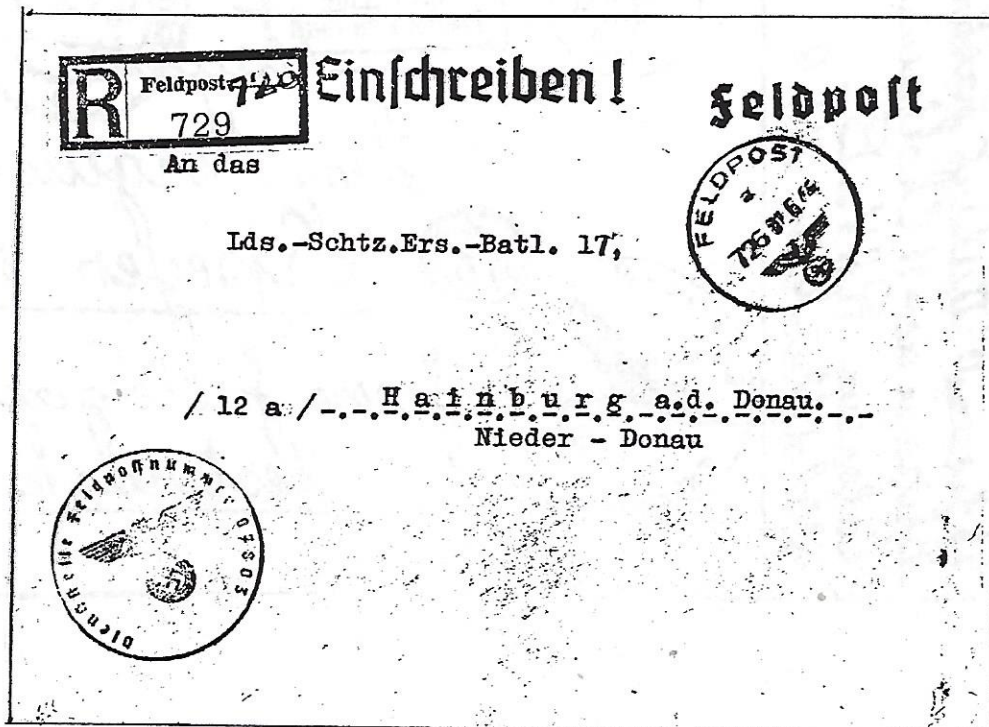

Formed late in 1941 in rear area of Army Group North, this "Sicherungs" division initially used rear area FpA z.b.V. 668 (Fp.# 46673) and Kenn 547 for their mail. This FpA was employed until a new division P.O., established on April 1, 1942, was assigned Fp.# 35349 as a return address and K-726 for use on registered mail in lieu of FpA 368.

On January 28, 1942, five thousand men of the 281st Security Division were encircled at 'fortress' Kholm. They held out against overwhelming odds until relieved on May 5. For the next few months the division was engaged in L. of C. (Lines of Communication) duties in the rear of Army Group North. The division went back into action in November 1942 when they were rushed to defend a portion of the hotly contested Demyansk salient in the 16th Army sector. They defended the Demyansk salient until it was abandoned in February 1943.

In the autumn of 1943 the 281st Security Division was again heavily engaged against Soviet forces in the northern sector of the front. Still in the front lines, the division was virtually destroyed during the Soviet summer offensive in July 1944 and was formally disbanded late in 1944. While supposed to perform rear area L. of C. missions, the 281st spent much of its time in the front lines.

## WAFFEN SS FELDPPOST: SS Freiwilligen-Division 'Charlemagne'

The Waffen-Sturmbrigade der SS 'Frankreich' was formed near Prag in the spring of 1944. This partially formed brigade was then transferred to Wildflecken maneuver area in December 1944 and expanded with mostly French and other foreign personnel. The unit was re-designated as the Waffen-SS Brigade 'Charlemagne' (franz. Nr. 1).

In February 1945 this unit was again expanded with the addition of support units and re-designated as the 33 SS Freiwilligen Division 'Charlemagne'. However, in terms of personnel this 'division' never exceeded 'Kampfgruppe' size.

This SS Feldpost cover addressed to a girl in Speyer, Germany was posted at Lager Wildflecken in December 1944 by a member of the 'Brigade der SS Charlemagne'. Note the "open unit" letter seal and SS censor hand stamp 'AS'. In addition, the sender apparently had the wrong 'Postleitzahl' (postal code) so the correct code '18' was added per the boxed 2-line hand stamp.
