

# THIRD REICH POSTAL RATES Streetcar Dispatch (Strassenbahn) in Hamburg



The streetcars in Hamburg had mailboxes attached to their back platforms. Mail deposited in these boxes, rather than conventional street boxes, assured that an item of mail would be delivered to the main post office (Hamburg 1) when the streetcar completed its circuit.

A special cancel showing both hours and minutes was applied in Hamburg 1. This cancel also included the word "Strassenbahn" (Streetcar). This service was available for letters, postcards, printed matter, samples, business papers and mixed sendings. The service was terminated in July 1943 due to extensive damage to the streetcar system caused by the Allied bombing campaign.


### Hamburg Streetcar Mail



The "Strassenbahn" (streetcar) system in Hamburg provided a means of expediting delivery of letters to the post office through the use of letterboxes attached to the rear of the streetcars. Begun in September 1920, letters could be deposited on all streetcars travelling in the direction of Hamburg 1, the Main post office. The fee for this service was 5 Pfg. in addition to the normal rate.

The streetcar letterboxes were emptied at collection points all along the route and delivered to Hamburg 1 by messengers. Although this service was available to the general public, it's main beneficiaries were the shops and commercial firms which lined the main thoroughfares.

During the Third Reich the Hamburg 1 post office used special roller cancels on streetcar mail. There are two types of roller cancel which differ only in the inscription which appears in the lower portion. The first cancel reads "Strassenbahn" only while the other has this text in smaller type followed by the letters "Fb".





Shown above are an item of commercial mail, franked for 16 Pfg. local rate plus 5 Pfg. fee for streetcar service, with Type I roller cancel dated April '36. At right is a Type II cancel also dated April '36.

In addition to these postal markings, I have seen reference to a hand cancel used during the war years. The streetcar postal service was discontinued sometime in 1943 due to extensive damage to the streetcar system caused by Allied bombing.

There are also routing instructions such as "Durch Strassenbahnbrief-kasten" (via streetcar letter box) applied by the sender but not required by the postal regulations.

### HAMBURG STREETCAR MAIL UPDATE by Jack Miskevich

The streetcars in Hamburg had mail boxes attached to their back platforms. Mail deposited in these boxes, rather than conventional street boxes, assured that an item of mail would be delivered to the main postoffice Hamburg 1 when the streetcar completed its circuit. There was a 5 Pfg. fee for this service which had to be pre-paid. While this streetcar postal service was detailed in TRSG Bulletins 56 and 72, the following are examples of different rates and markings on cover to further our understanding of this service.

Fig. 1) Cover to U.S.A. was posted in May 1939. The 25 Pfg. stamp pays the foreign surface rate while the 5 Pfg Pfg. stamp was the fee for transmittal to Hamburg 1 via the streetcar system.

The roller cancel used in Hamburg 1 has "Straßenbahn" (streetcar) in the lower segment.





Fig. 2) Shown below is an airmail cover sent to a crew member of the steamer "Cap Arcona" in Lisbon, Portugal in June 1937. A similar cancel as shown above ties 40 Pfg. airmail and 5 Pfg. streetcar rate stamps.







Fig. 3) Another airmail cover, this was sent to Johannesburg, South Africa in October 1936. The 40 Pfg. & 20 Pfg. airmail stamps are tied by conventional Hamburg 1 hand cancels. However, the backside has a roller cancel with "Straßenbahn Fb" in the lower segment. Does anyone know what "Fb" designates?

Fig. 4) Feldpost cover sent to Hamburg-Rahlstedt has proper unit seal and required no postage. The cancel reveals that it was delivered via the streetcar service which was not free. The manuscript "8" denotes that the receiver must pay the 5 Pfg. fee plus 50% penalty (2½ Pfg. rounded to 3 Pfg.).



ED. NOTE: This cover has an interesting wrinkle for feldpost collectors. While the D'siegel notes the sender's unit as Fp# 30822, the manuscript return address is Fp# 28532. The former is the original number of 4.Kp/Local Defense Btl. 691. As part of the consolidation of Feldpost numbers in Rev. 6 of the FpU, this unit was assigned Fp# 28532E in June 1942. At the time this letter was posted, the new number had been assigned but the new D'siegel was not yet available. JEL


### Early Airmail Rate Period

For the time period 23 April 1924 to 30 April 1934 the airmail surcharge to most [\*] European countries was 20 Rpf. per 20 gm. When you intersect this time period with the period of National Socialism, you get the 15 month interval 30 January 1933 to 30 April 1934. In my experience, airmail covers to European destinations during this period are fairly scarce. Shown below are two examples from my collection.

- [\*] Airmail surcharges to Austria, Danzig, Lithuania, Memel and the Saar were the same as German inland rates
- Posted: Deutsch-Amerikanische-Seepost Bremen-New York. Posted on Ocean liner 'Bremen' on May 25, 1933 to Berlin-Wilmersdorf Backstamped: Berlin C2 on May 27, 1933 (12-13)

Franking (45 Rpf.): 20 Rpf. = Airmail surcharge for weight 0-20 grams. 25 Rpf. = Foreign letter rate for weight 0 - 20 grams




Pneumatic mail service was available in Berlin, Munich and Vienna. From January 30, 1933, letters up to 20 grams were allowed. After July 15, 1938, letters up to 100 grams and postcards were allowed. After September 18, 1939, printed matter, money orders and registered letters were also allowed.

### THE BERLIN PNEUMATIC POST DURING THE THIRD REICH by John Miskevich

In 1865 a new type of mail transportation service was introduced into Germany. The Berlin pneumatic post, the "Rohrpost", quite literally the "tube post" was a system of transporting written dispatches by the use of compressed air to propel sealed cylinders containing peices of mail through underground tubes.

The first system constructed in Berlin ran between the Central Telegraph Office and the "Bourse" (Stock Exchange) and was built because traffic between these two points had become too heavy for the ordinary telegraph system to handle. The tubes were placed one meter below the road surface. Down in the tubes, ten to twelve cylinders traveled together in "trains" at around 1000 meters per minute. The entire journey lasted 90 seconds and mail could be delivered in as little as seven minutes station to station.

In 1875, German Postmaster General, Dr. von Stephen, ordered the building of a very extensive net of pneumatic mail system covering the whole area of the city of Berlin. When it opened on December 1, 1876, the new network consisted of fifteen offices and for the first time were open to the general public. By 1890 the number of Rohrpost Offices had increased to forty-one and by 1904 there were ninety stations, the whole idea having resulted in a big

Physically, the system consisted of a Northern Circle and a Southern Circle linked at the Central Telegraph Office at Franzosische Strasse. In 1891 the Rohrpost was altered from a radial layout to a polygonal shape with stations added at existing post offices having now been embodied in the Rohrpost system.

In 1927 a special express line was added to link the major banks in Berlin by pneumatic post. In 1931, Rohrpost Offices were installed at Tempelhof Airport post offices and in 1936 special sections were added to the line to deal with the Olympic Games. In 1937, the Rohrpost could boast ninety-four stations operating over a circuit of 257 kilometers with most stations from .75 to 1.50 kilometers apart. In 1940 it was estimated that the Berlin Rohrpost transmitted by tube over 7.8 million peices of mail and telegrams.

Rohrpost cancellations are distinctive because they indicate in the date line the exact time of posting numerically to within ten minutes. Rohrpost Offices sent and received mail on a ten minute schedule. By contrast, regular cancellations in use in Berlin were exact only to the hour.

A number of significant changes in the functioning of the Rohrpost of importance to Third Reich collectors are contained in the "Amtsblatt des Reichspostministerium" (Bulletin of the National Postal Ministry), Hr. 66, Decree 295 (1927). The postal rate structure was amended at the time creating a three-way separation in the calculation of postal fees.

First, a seperate fee was charged for the transmission of different classes of mail based upon that kind of service. Many different types of postal service including insured and registered could now be used in combination with the Rohrpost. (The system handled letters weighing up to 100 grams) Second, an additional seperate fee of 10 Pfennig was required for all mail dispatched by way of the Rohrpost. And third, an express fee was charged seperately for transmittal in conformity with existing postal regulations.

In the aftermath of World War I and the inflationary years that followed, the Rohrpost fell into disrepair. Renovation began in 1926 but the system continued to suffer for a lack of maintenance. One reason for the physical wear to the system was that much mail arriving in Berlin was fed into the Rohrpost system without any extra charge.

Beginning in 1927 a fee of 10 Pfennig was charged for each piece of mail arriving in Berlin for forwarding by the Rohrpost. The fees which were accumulated for this service would be used to pay for maintenance and expansion of the Rohrpost system. Upon the receipt of mail at the various Berlin railroad postoffices, letters would be placed into the Rohrpost if they bore the red "im Berlin durch Rohrpost" and the 10 Pfennig fee had been paid in advance at the point of origin.

The "Amtsblatt" Nr. 77 on August 22, 1933 published a Decree Nr. 316 which extended Rohrpost service. At this time the previously described service was expanded to include outgoing mail posted in Berlin. One could now send a letter with the notation "Im Berlin durch Rohrpost" by way of pneumatic post for an additional fee of 10 Pfennig. The letter would be sent to the nearest and appropriate railroad postoffice for dispatch outside of the city of Berlin. According to the "Amtsblatt" Nr. 21, Decree 81 (1935) this special service was extended to Rohrpost offices located at the Berlin airports.

Extensive Allied bombing of Berlin during World War II almost totally destroyed the pneumatic postal system. It is recorded that in late 1946, only fourteen Rohrpost offices managed to operate over a reduced network of thirty-seven kilometers. Although the system was subsequently rebuilt in the western portion of Berlin, its use has been restricted to internal postoffice communication since 1963.

Other pneumatic postal systems operated during the Third Reich inside Munich, Vienna and Prague. An examination of the Prague Rohrpost system from 1939 until 1945 with illustrations of this mail will be the subject of a future article.

### Rohrpost Illustrations

### Fig.

- 1. Cover posted June 23, 1939, 18.40 hours at Berlin W80 dispatched "Mit Rohrpost zum Anhalter Bahnhof" (By Pneumatic Post Uninterrupted to the Railroad Station) arriving a helf-hour later. Thirty-five pfennig pays the foreign surface rate plus ten pfennig Rohrpost. Note the use of a pink cellophane "Rohrpost" label similar to the familiar red "Eilbote Expres" (Special Delivery).
- Berlin W8 Rohrpost cover dated June 12, 1937, 10.50 hours with written instructions "In Berlin mit Rohrpost". It arrived at 2. the Central Airport ten minutes later for dispatch outside of the city of Berlin.
- Postcard with pink label "Rohrpost und Eilbote" (Pneumatic Post and Special Delivery) was transmitted from Schoneberg 3 at "10  $-\bar{V}$  (ormittag)", that is, 10 AM and arrived 20 minutes later at Schoneberg 1. The 55 pf. postage pays the local postcard rate, Rohrpost, and Express fees.
- 4. This sirmail cover chased around France in an attempt to reach a passenger aboard the ocean liner "Europa". It began its journey within the tubes of the Berlin Rohrpost. Paid is the foreign surface, Rohrpost, and European airmail rates.
- Rohrpost cover dated December 16, 1938, 12.00 hours transmitted via internal airmail has the arrival handstamp of the ocean liner "Europa". Paid is the 25 pf. letter rate, 10 pf. Rohrpost, 5 pf. internal airmail, with an additional 25 pf to cover airmail from New York City to Los Angeles.
- Pursuant to written instructions, "Mit Rohrpost zum Flughafen" (By Pneumatic Post to the Airport), this cover to Brasil reached the Berlin sirport in ten minutes.
- Rohrpostcard (Mi. RP 25) issued in 1934 with a 55 pfennig Hindenburg imprint. This card was dispatched from Berlin-Charlottenberg 4 at 10.50 hours in the morning and arrived at Berlin-Wilmersdorf 1 at noon. I like to think that the postcard reached its destination before the ink was dry.
- Rohrpostcard (Mi. RP 26) with Hitler imprint issued in 1941. card pays the 5 pf. local postcard rate, the 10 pf Rohrpost, and a 40 pf special delivery fee pursuant to existing post office This card is very scarce legitimately used as Rohrpost. regulations.
- Express cover posted at Zamosc in the General Gouvernment on October 4, 1940 addressed to Berlin W50. Pursuant to post office regulation Special Delivery to Berlin from outside the city was transmitted by Rohrpost. Note the backstamps indicating that this cover arrived from the East at Berlin Ol7 and was dispatched to Berlin W50 by way of the Rohrpost.

### POSTAGE DUE (NACHGEBÜHR)

Postage due can arise from underfranking, as a forwarding fee or in connection with certain official mail. For underfranked internal mail, postage due was the deficit plus a penalty of 50% of the deficit. For forwarded mail, only the deficit (if any) was due. For underfranked mail destined for a foreign country, the letter "T" (Taxe) was applied (usually in blue) to the cover to alert the receiving postal clerk that postage was due. By UPU regulations the amount due was double the deficit. The following are examples of postage due mail



### **Fees for Forwarded Mail**

### I.) Letters and Postcards

No forwarding fee was required for the following:

- 1. Local forwarding of local letters.
- 2. Intercity forwarding of intercity letters.
- 3. Forwarding from one foreign country to another foreign country.

For forwarding a local letter to another city or an internal letter to a foreign country, the forwarding fee was the difference in postage and was collected as postage due.

Hence; the forwarding fee is the deficit of 15 Pfg Note the handwritten postage due notation indicating 30 cts due (By UPU regulations, postage due on international letters was to be indicated in French centimes).







### SPECIAL CANCEL FEE



### Rate Changes in August 1944

Effective August 13, 1944, German parcel postal rates were changed and several other rates were discontinued. The following two covers illustrate that not everyone got the message.

Fig. 1) Cover marked "Drucksache" has 3 Pfg. franking for single-weight printed matter rate. However, posting date is August 19, 1944 and all printed matter rates were discontinued effective August 13, 1944.



Fig. 2) Parcel card has 75 Pfg. franking which is correct for parcel post rates in effect through August 12, 1944 (60 Pfg. for weight of 3KG to zones 3, 4 or 5 plus 15 Pfg. delivery fee). However, posting date is August 19, 1944 and under new rates correct franking is 60 Pfg. (weight of 3KG to Fernzone).



### **Chart for Croatian Postal Rates**

One of my primary interests is to collect and exhibit Croatian postal rates. Anyone who has delved into this area will attest that there are many rate changes which cause problems in attempting to ascertain if the rate shown on a particular item of mail is correct. Although there were many rate changes during the short life of Croatia, not much is available in the form of official postal documents. To compensate for this documentation, I developed the chart shown below as both a way to keep tabs on my exhibit and as a guide in evaluating any potential additions to the exhibit. I hope the chart will prove to be a valuable tool for fellow Croatia postal rate collectors or as an example for developing similar charts for other countries.
