Review: Die Feldpostnummern der deutschen Kriegsmarine 1939-1945
by Norbert Kannapin. A Selfpublication of the author

This book gives in numerical order according to Feldpost number the identity of over 4000 numbers assigned to German naval units during World War II. As stated in the author's introduction, the listing is compiled from the "...Feldpostübersicht (Military Mail Survey), my own research, and the records of the German Red Cross". This book is a very necessary addition to the library of all those interested in German WWII naval mail. It makes available for the first time to the general philatelic public, and in a convenient form, material that has existed for some time to select groups of individuals in the USA, Germany and in England. Its appearance should help stimulate interest in this already highly popular area of specialization.

However, this book as well as several other similar articles that have appeared in the English and German philatelic press in recent years, also does a great disservice to the philatelic researcher for reasons that I shall outline in this review. Two distinct areas must be documented when Feldpost numbers are identified. The source of the data published and the documented period of use of the number with the identified unit.

The source of the information must be known so that the credibility of the information can be established. Thus the official Feldpostübersicht (FPÜ), or Military Mail Survey might have more weight in case of disagreement with say, material based on the memory of an old soldier, etc. As an example, Feldpostnummer (FPN) 17 984 and 17 987 are listed by Kannapin as having been used by the U-boat Tender Lech. The FPÜ, Part III, Vol. 10, for May 30, 1942 (in my possession) states that only FPN 17 987 was used. The Suchdienst listing¹ also only shows FPN 17 987 having been used by the Lech and furthermore shows the FPN 17 984 to have been assigned to at least two different army units during the war. I do not believe this listing is right, and furthermore believe its source can be traced to an article in the German press which had a typographical error that was propagated by the author. This is why I stress the importance of documentary evidence of all sources of information. At a minimum, a detailed bibliography should have been provided by the author. The ideal solution would have had a coded reference to the source opposite each number given.

The second important area that must be documented is the date of usage. It has been often stated by various authors in this publication that the same number could have been assigned to more than one unit throughout the course of the war. Thus to uniquely identify a number to have been used by a particular unit, the dates of usage by that unit must be known. Now fortunately, a significant amount of

the numbers assigned to naval units remained constant throughout the war (and this might account for their popularity over other collecting areas). However, it is known that often if ships were sunk, their numbers were reassigned often to the army or the SS. Thus FPN 01 345 is as Kannapin correctly states; i.e., the number used during WW II by the destroyer Wilhelm Heidkamp. However, this ship was sunk during the Norwegian campaign on April 10, 1940, and the number appears in the Suchdienst listing¹ to have been given to the army unit Feld.Ers.Btl. 94. Thus extreme care must be taken that the covers date is correct and Kannapin gives no indication that there is even a possible conflict. Similarly, FPN 00 396 is listed as being used by Mar.Art.Abt. 115 by Kannapin. In Part III of the FPÜ, Vol. 10 for May 1942, we find that the listing is as shown by Kannapin, but that some time after May 30, 1942, the listing was eliminated from the FPÜ. The Suchdienst listing¹ also gives the army listing, Laz.Zug.807. Again it is obvious that without dates, nothing conclusive can be stated.

Though this reviewer has had only a brief opportunity to use this new listing, I have noticed it appears to have its share of typographical errors which plague all listings of this type that I have seen in print, as well as mechanical mistakes such as pages bound out of order. In summary I recommend its purchase not because of its excellence, but rather because there is nothing better available and the data provided is a must for collectors of this type of material. However, this review hopefully makes clear that this listing must be used with caution and wherever possible its data be cross-checked against other references..

THE BATTLES OF NARVIK

The collecting of German naval feldpost covers invariably leads one into interesting areas of naval history. Such was the case when I recently assembled a small exhibit entitled "The Battles of Narvik" -using covers from each German ship involved, an accompanying photo of each vessel and appropriate philatelic/statistical/historical information.

The "Battles of Narvik" were two of the many actions which erupted during the German invasion of Norway (Operation "Weserübung") on April 9, 1940. The story of the Narvik phase actually began on April 2, 1940, when the German battlecruisers "Scharnhorst" and "Gneisenau" sailed for Norwegian waters in company with ten destroyers. Aware that the British were determined to prevent heavy German warships from breaking out into the Atlantic, the German fleet commander (Vice Adm. Günther Lütjens) was under orders to lure British battle units away from the Narvik area using Scharnhorst and Gnesenau as bait, while the ten destroyers went on into Narvik with the landing forces.

The plan worked perfectly: On the morning of April 9th, British Admiral Whitworth in the battlecruiser "Renown", sighted Scharnhorst and Gneisenau 50 miles off Narvik in heavy weather. The two German ships ran to the northwest, as planned, with Admiral Whitworth in hot pursuit. During a brief exchange of fire, Renown landed three 15 inch shells on Gneisenau - ruining her fire control system and knocking out her forward 11 inch turret. Contact was soon lost due to bad weather and for the price of one damaged battlecruiser, British forces had been prevented from savaging the German invasion force.

Meanwhile, Narvik had fallen to Commodore Paul Bonte's ten destroyers (4th Destroyer Flotilla) which had smashed the Norwegian coast-defense ships "Eidsvold" and "Norge" and landed their troops, who took the port without trouble.

At noon on the 9th, the British learned of the Narvik landing and Captain Warburton-Lee's 2nd Destroyer Flotilla was directed to enter Narvik's Ofot Fjord and attack any warships or merchantmen present. After sounding out the German strength at Narvik (which was sadly underestimated) from the Norwegian pilot station at Tranøy during the evening, Warbuton-Lee attacked Ofot Fjord at dawn on the 10th. The British destroyers Hardy, Hunter and Havoc sailed up the fjord and sank the German destroyers "Wilhelm Heidkamp" (Bonte's flagship) and "Anton Schmitt". The British destroyers Hotspur and Hostile weighed in for a second attack and sank six transports. The remaining German destroyers were, however, well deployed in the branching side-fjords and came in for a savage counterattack - trapping the British force. Warburton-Lee was

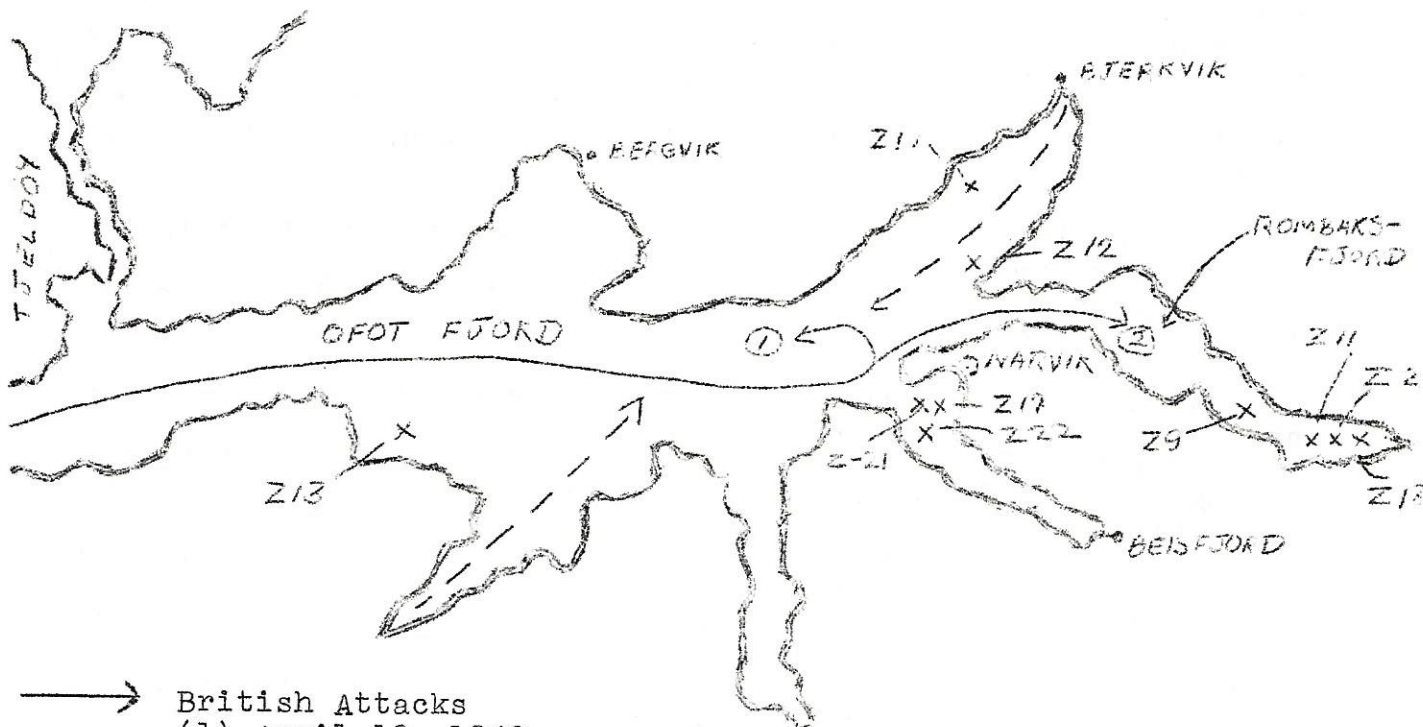
killed, the Hardy was knocked out and the Hotspur badly damaged. Luckily for the British, the victorious German destroyers did not press home their attacks and by 0630 the "1st Battle of Narvik" was over.

On April 13th, British Admiral Whitworth, now aware of the German strength, took the battlecruiser "Warspite" up Ofot Fjord with nine destroyers and the "2nd Battle of Narvik" ensued.

The remaining German destroyers were hunted down and smashed one by one. By nightfall of the 13th, none of the original ten German destroyers at Narvik were left. Sunk were:

- "Erich Koellner" (Z13)
- "Hermann Kunne" (Z19)
- "Hans Ludemann" (Z18)
- "Diether von Roeder" (Z17)
- "Wolfgang Zenker" (Z9)
- "Bernd von Arnim" (Z11)
- "Georg Thiele" (Z2)
- "Erich Giese" (Z12)

British troops were landed in Norway on April 14, taking Narvik on May 28th. The position of these forces was untenable, however, due to the collapsing allied front in France and they could do little but wreck the port facilities and evacuate on June 8th, exactly four days after the historic evacuation of Dunkirk.
