## Study Group Notes

### NEW PUBLICATION:

As noted in TRSG Bulletin 48, a large collection of paintings and other art done in Nazi propaganda units was seized by American forces and has been in the Pentagon ever since the end of W.W.II. See "The Pentagon's Nazi Art" article on p. 31 of the Feb. 22, '82 Newsweek.

"The German War Artists" by John P. Weber is expertly produced with superb color reproductions of 48 paintings as well as numerous photos of the artists. The author graduated from West Point in 1964 and was a rifle company commander in South East Asia. Collectors of propaganda cards will find familiar names such as Wolfgang Willrich & Franz Eichorst as well as a complete chronicle of the way 8,722 war-related works of art were found and the effort's of West Germany to regain these works. As a pending bill in the U.S. Congress may soon return a portion of this art, this book is both timely and highly recommended. Price is \$24.95 and can be ordered from: Cerebus Book Co., P.O. ### IV.) Double-ring

Clement lists "Ring" cancels in two sizes & types, a 27/13/0 mm hand cancel and a 21/18/0 mm machine cancel w/7 wavy lines. The latter was used only in East Prussia & Riga, Latvia.




Fig. 20) P'card from Fp.# 19788 (1.Battr./Res.Searchlight Btl. 909) sent Oct.'39 has rural P.O. h'stamp and stumme cancel with \*\* 10 11 \*\* and "R" used in Regensburg.

Fig. 21) Early use of stumme cancel, official cover from "Stab/Pi. Btl. 195" posted Sept. '39.




Fig. 22) Iron Cross Feldpost card sent March '42 from Luftwaffe Medical Squadron in Bayreuth.

V.) Circle/bridge/fence

Two size "Kreisbrückengitter" hand cancels are listed by Clement, 25/15/9 and 28/17/9 mm. These are found plain and with combinations of letters, numerals and asterisks.







Fig. 26) Official cover sent June '42 from Fp.# 28374 (Kfz. Instands. Kp. 133) with code "H".





Fig. 27) Lettersheet sent Dec. '44 from Fp.# 33700 (Werfer Brigade Stab 6) with 3 star cancel code.

#### VI.) Circle/bridge

Clement lists two size "Kreissteg" cancels, 26/0/9 and 30/0/9, noting that this type was used in western Germany.

VII.) Circle/double bow

The "Kreisdoppelsehne" hand cancel is listed by Clement in two sizes, 26/17/9 and 24/15/9 mm. These cancels were only used by post offices in Austria. The former size has no code markings listed while the latter is found with code letters a thru f.






Fig. 30) Lettersheet sent Sept.'44 from Fp.# 27754 (Night Recon. Squadron 7) has unit seal of Luftwaffe Air District Command XVII on front. Cancel with code 'b' listed by Clement as used in Graz and Braunau/Inn.



### VIII.) Mute Railroad Cancel

Clement lists one "Ellipse" cancel size of 37:27 mm. These very scarce cancels were used to process Feldpost found while sorting mail aboard travelling post offices. The usual details found on ordinary RR cancels such as the rail line and "Zug" (train) number are lacking with only the date in evidence.


Fig. 31) Cover from Fp.# 10225 (1. Kp./Ldssch. Btl. 453) with "stumme" Bahn-post cancel dated Jan.'40. The code '---' at bottom listed by Clement as used in Bad Kissengen.



### IX.) Triple ring/date bridge

One "Ringbrücke" hand cancel, sized 35/24/15/9 mm, is listed by Clements as having been used in western Germany.

## Propaganda Card Corner

Member Carmelo Cosentino sent in this multi-color card depicting German and Italian troopers in action. Of Italian origin, the card depicts the familiar "SS" runes in red at upper right and on the collar of the German soldier on the right. The "double-forked" emblem in white is also on the collar of the Italian soldier. I've never seen this emblem in connection with the Italian Waffen-SS units (see TRSG Bulletin 56). Can any member identify this emblem?

The reverse side of this card has "Cartolina Postale" at top with "N. P. aprile 1944" printed vertically in center.

While technically not German, I believe that Italian cards with the "brotherhood-in-arms" theme fall within the scope of our group and will be featured in future segments of the "Corner".



Also shown at right by Mr. Cosentino are two SS recruiting ads from Italian newspapers of the period.

## THE ARMISTICE COMMISSION

The purpose of this article is to provide information on postal markings used in connection with the "Waffenstillstandskommission" (Armistice Commission) whose function was to deal with problems arising from the French armistice which had been signed on June 22, 1940.

### I.) Historical Background

On Nov. 8, 1918, a German delegation headed by Matthias Erzburger, a Centrist political leader, met with the Allied Power's delegation, headed by Marshal Ferdinand Foch, in a railroad car drawn up on a siding in Compiegne forest. In response to the German request for an armistice, Foch provided a harsh set of terms which were not negotiable. Germany was to evacuate all conquered territories, return to France the provinces of Alsace & Lorraine seized in 1870, totally disarm her Armies & fleets and agree to pay a crushing war-reparation bill. These terms were presented to Field Marshal von Hindenburg, who protested but finally agreed and authorized the delegation to sign the armistice which went into effect on Nov. 11, 1918.

During the period between the armistice and Germany's signing of the Treaty of Versailles on June 28, 1919, an armistice commission met periodically at Spa in Belgium.




Fig. 1) Front & rear views of registered express Feldpost cover posted in April 1919 from the German Armistice Commission at Spa. The special date cancel is reproduced full size.



On May 10, 1940, German airborn & infantry invaded Holland and Belgium. When Anglo-French divisions rushed forward to meet them, powerful German Panzer armies crashed across the French border through the Ardennes Forest. The British and French armies in Belgium were cut off and trapped when German tank columns reached the English Channel.

Having expelled the British from the continent, the German armies turned south to destroy the remaining, disorganized French forces. Eager to share in the spoils of an already defeated France, Mussolini declared war upon the Allies on June 10th. While the Italian armies in the south went nowhere, the German Panzer armies swept down upon Paris and beyond. Hitler received word through Spain on June 17th that Marshal Petain, head of a newly formed French Cabinet, desired an armistice.

On June 21st, in the same railroad dining car in the forest of Compiègne where Marshal Foch had dictated the terms of the Armistice to the Kaiser's Germany (the French had preserved it as a national monument), the terms of an armistice were dictated by General Keitel to the French delegation. The armistice was signed on June 22, 1940.




Fig. 2) B & W Photocard shows German delegation arriving at railroad car in Compiègne to dictate terms of the armistice. Note: Card produced by O. Hoppe of Berlin.

An Armistice Commission was established and held a series of meetings at the Nassauer Hotel in Wiesbaden during July to November 1940. The three countries represented at these meetings were Germany, France and Italy.

The Armistice Comission met annually at various dates. The last meeting was held in June, 1944.

#### II.) Postal Markings

As the armistice meetings involved military personnel, mail could be sent as feldpost providing that the appropriate "briefstempel" was in evidence. The following letter seals were used from '40 to '42 during meetings of the Armistice Commission:




Fig. 7) Private mail sent Sept. '40 has unit seal of "Army Control Inspection of the German Armistice Commission". This unit reported any violations of the terms of the armistice.

ONE OF MY FAVORITE COVERS  
by Ron Patterson

This cover illustrates the changes in censor markings which took place late in 1944 as a result of the transfer of responsibility for the examination of civil mails from the Armed Forces High Command to the "Abwehr" (Military Intelligence). Censor marking nos. are per Riemer.

Registered letter to Dunapataj, Hungary posted in Höchst Oct. 23, '44 routed through Vienna Censor office. After examination, letter resealed (over postage stamps) with tape printed "Oberkommando der Wehrmacht" (G-53a). Undeliverable, letter was returned by Hungarian postal system and once more arrived at Vienna Censor office. After opening the opposite side of the cover, a new-style tape printed "Zensurstelle" (G-55) was used for sealing. Note that both new & old style tapes are tied by a "Zensurstelle" handstamp (G-6). As cover was backstamped in Höchst on Nov. 18, '44, it is reasonable to assume that the new style sealing labels were first used in Vienna in early Nov. '44.




Fig. 8) New handstamps used in '43 by (top to bottom) French, German and Italian delegations. This last h' stamp shown on cover sent from Turin by a member of the Italian Armistice Commission in Feb.'43.


Fig. 9) The same design special cancel was used in Wiesbaden from '40 to '44 during the Armistice Commission meetings. Shown below is the '40 version full size and the '44 version on a registered cover.



ONE OF MY FAVORITE COVERS

## AUSLANDS-ORGANISATION: More Cards and Cancels

by Ronald Patterson

Recent articles by J. Lewis and R. Szymanski have provided information on the Auslands-Organisation's 6th National Conference held in the spring of 1938 in Stuttgart. The following is coverage of earlier and later A-O meetings.

The 1st and 2nd annual meetings in 1933 and 1934 apparently received no postal recognition through special cancels. The 3rd annual meeting, held in Erlangen in Sept. 1935, was commemorated by a slogan cancel (Fig. 1) inscribed "Auslands-Organisation/ der N.S.D.A.P./ Arbeits- tagung 7.-9.35". A more elaborate cancel (Fig. 2) was used in Erlangen for the 4th meeting held Sept. 2.-7. 1936. This cancel has the A-O emblem and designates the meeting as "Reichstagung d. Auslandsdeutschen" (National Days for Germans Abroad) rather than the earlier "Arbeits- tagung" (Working Days). I know of no postcards for the 1933 through 1936 period.



The 5th National Conference was held in Stuttgart from Aug. 29 to Sept. 5 in 1937. The move to this city was appropriate since this was the location of the Deutsches Ausland-Institut (German Foreign Institute). Founded in 1917, this institute was a central exchange for statistics and information on Germans living abroad. Postally, there is a slogan cancel (Fig. 3) and postcard (Fig. 4) commemorating this meeting. Unfortunately, this card is not in my collection. Perhaps one of our TRSG members can provide details on the artist and publisher.



The 1937 conference in Stuttgart was significant in relation to the additional phrase "Stadt der Auslandsdeutschen" (City of Germans in Foreign Lands) which appeared thereafter on regular city cancels. This designated Stuttgart as one of a limited number of German cities with "titles". Others were:

Berlin - "Reichshauptstadt" (Capital city of the German Empire)  
 Graz - "Stadt der Volkserhebung" (City of the national uprising)  
 Frankfurt/M. - "Stadt der deutschen Handwerks" (City of German Crafts)  
 Leipzig - "Reichsmessestadt" (City of National Trade Fair)  
 München - "Hauptstadt der Bewegung" (Capital city of the Nazi Movement)  
 Nürnberg - "Stadt der Reichsparteitage" (City of National Party Days)  
 Wittenberg - "Lutherstadt" (City of Martin Luther)

The postcard and cancel for the 1938 meeting have been detailed in Bulletins 63 and 64. There was also a slogan cancel used in Stuttgart that year which is similar in format to the 1937 cancel (Fig. 3).

The 7th and final meeting was held in Graz Aug. 25 to Sept. 1, 1939. Selection of this city may have been in recognition of the "homecoming" of Austria to the Reich which came about by the "Anschluss" in 1938. The postcard and special cancel commemorating the 7th meeting are detailed below. No further meetings are known, probably due to the war.

PROVISIONAL POSTMARKS OF SUDETENLAND  
by Jim Lewis

The German takeover of the Sudetenland in October 1938 triggered the use of many "provisional" cancellations. These can form the basis for an interesting collection, particularly when found on postally-used covers because such covers often show evidence of the efforts made to erase all vestiges of Czechoslovakian domination. Prior to this time, the towns in the largely German-speaking region used bi-lingual post marks which often included the Czech district.

The purpose of this article is to illustrate covers from this period of "bloodless conquest". For a listing of the post offices in the Sudeten-German territory, see Jim Duffy's comprehensive directory which appeared in Bulletins 22, 25, 27, 28, 29 and 48.



Boxed handstamp used at Mies (formerly Mies-Stříbro) on Oct. 9th.






Fig. 9 Examples of modified cancels used in Liebenstein (sans Libstejn) and Jauering (sans Javornik).




Fig. 10 Printed envelope from Nixdorf (sans Nikulasovice) has rubber stamped "Sudetengau, Deutschland" in place of "Bohemia" in return address.




Fig.11 My favorite Sudeten town! Pre-printed envelope with modified cancel of Hotzenplotz (sans Osoblaha).




Fig.12 Locally produced cancellations used late November 1938. (Top) ring type with inscription "Reichenberg, Sudetengau". (Bottom) From Aussig 1 in "Kreisbrücke" style cancel.
