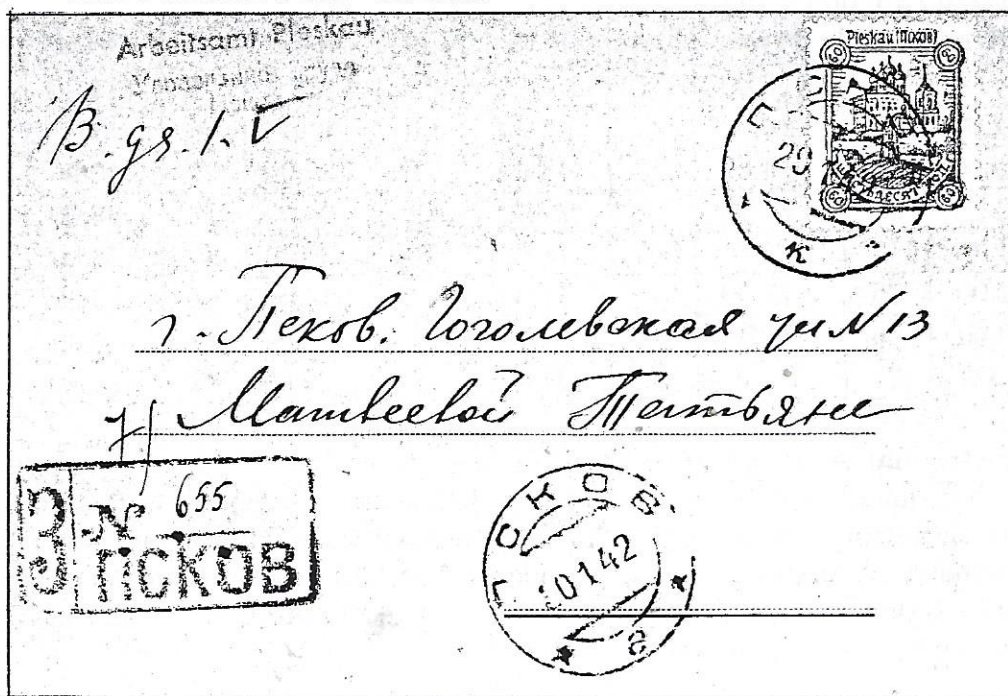

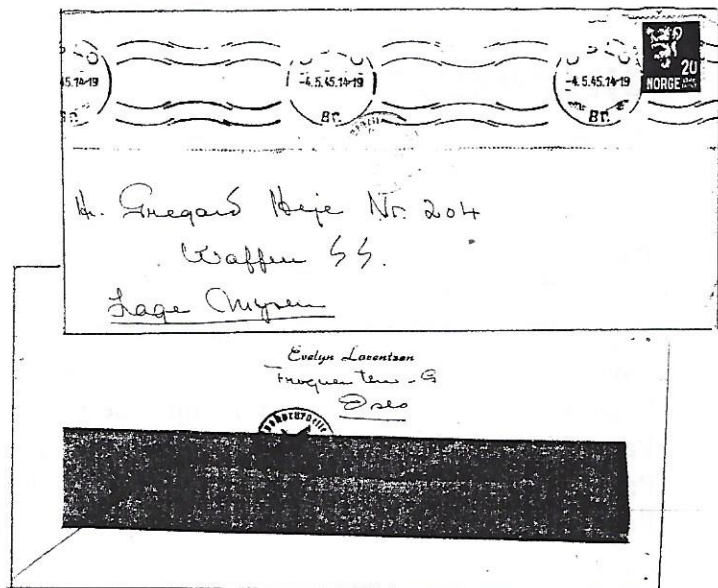


STUDY GROUP NOTES

New Years Resolution –for our members there should be no more serious undertaking for the year 2006 than to send your hard working editor an entry for the “From My Collection” feature. Once you’ve seen your name in print in our Bulletin, your life will never be the same!

Übungspost – Edward Leshar discussed “Übungspost (Exercise Mail) 1939” in the TRSG Bulletin 157 and asked several questions. Robert Höhn included a detailed treatment of this subject in his ‘Feldpost vor dem II. Weltkrieg 1936-1939’ Postgeschichte-Handbuch published by Poststempelgilde e. V. in 1995 as its Heft 143. Höhn lists the various military organizations or units involved with their Feldpost numbers. Mail from the 1939 exercises is fairly scarce, but not rare, judging by listings in German auction catalogs. The examples of such mail in my collection suggest that there was confusion about soldiers having a free franking privilege before September 3, 1939, the official beginning of World War II Feldpost activity. The entire Höhn book is highly informative and essential for the Feldpost collector.

Cover Illustration: A bilingual (Russian & German) form card posted on January 20, 1942 by the Pleskau Arbeitsamt (Labor Office). At this time Pleskau, located in northern Russia, was in an area under German Military Administration that was Headquarters of Army Group North. The Pleskau City Post was initiated on August 7, 1941 to provide local postal service and functioned until April 30, 1942 when the city was incorporated into the Deutsche Dienstpost Ostland network. 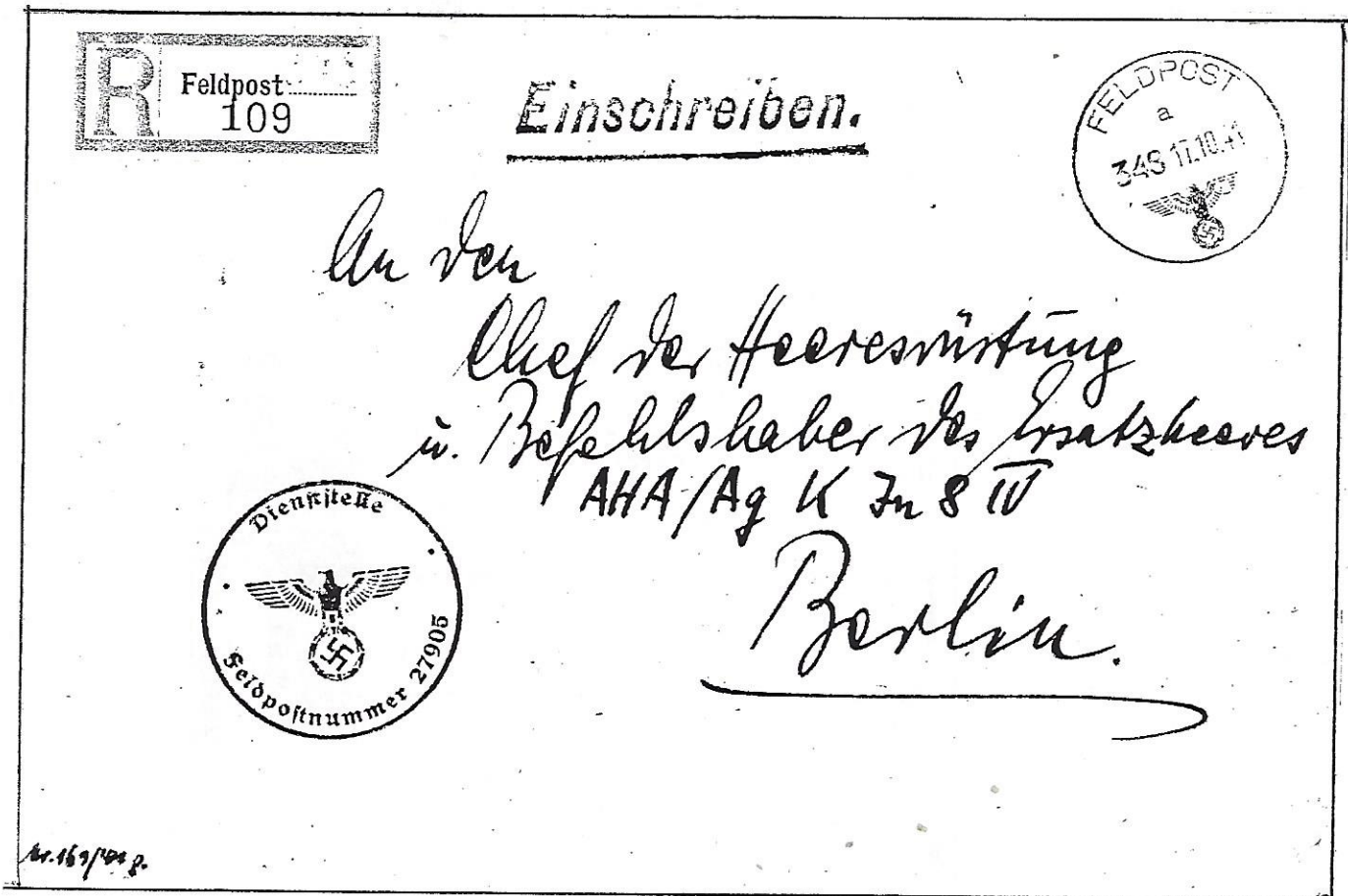
373rd Infantry Division

Formed in January 1943 in Wehrkreis XVII and trained in Austria, the two-regiment 373rd Infantry Division consisted of Croatian personnel with German cadres. Called a "deutsch-kroatische" (German - Croatian) division, the P.O. was assigned Fp.# 07103 as a return address and K-349 for use on registered mail in lieu of tactical FpA 373.

This division spent most of its career performing Line of Communication duties and fighting Tito's guerrillas in Yugoslavia. Considered a fourth rate combat unit that suffered excessive rates of desertion throughout its existence, the 373rd Infantry Division saw action against the Russians in the last few months of the war and surrendered near Sisak in Yugoslavia in April 1945.



Cover sent to Chief of Equipment for the Replacement Army at Berlin in October 1944 from Fp. # 27905 (Bakery Company 211) via Field Post Office 373 (K-349).

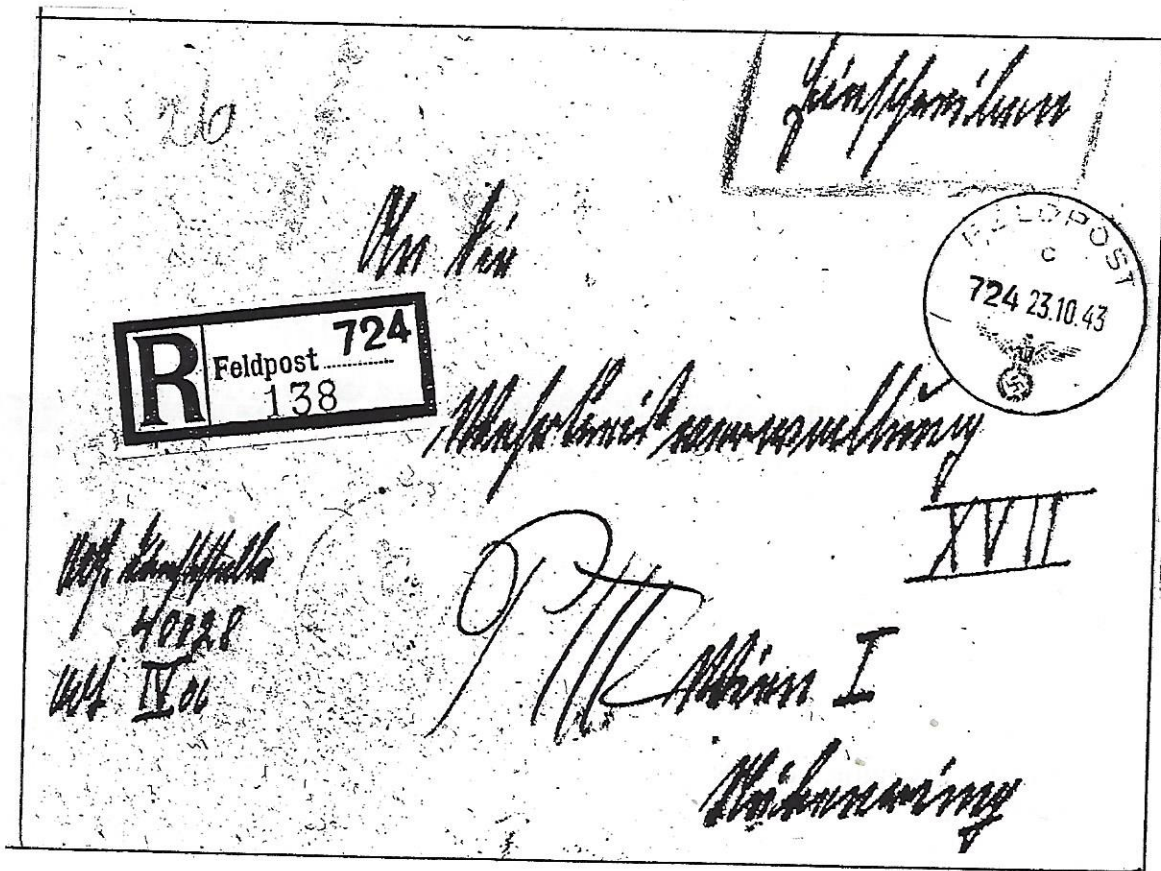

Initially formed in Wehrkreis XVII as the 717th (Static) Infantry Division in April 1941, then sent to Yugoslavia where it conducted anti-partisan operations until the spring of 1943.

In the summer of 1943 the 717th (Static) Infantry Division was converted to the 117th Jäger Division and sent to Greece, where it guarded the Peloponesus until the summer of 1944. The post office unit was assigned Fp. # 46241 as a return address and Kenn 724 as a coded identity for registered mail in lieu of tactical FpA 117.

The 117th Jäger Division took part in the withdrawal of German forces through the Balkans and sustained heavy losses against Tito's partisans in September 1944. It fought against the Russians in 1945 and was in transit to the 6th SS Panzer Army in Austria when Berlin fell. At the end of the war, the 117th Jäger Division surrendered to American forces near Steyr .

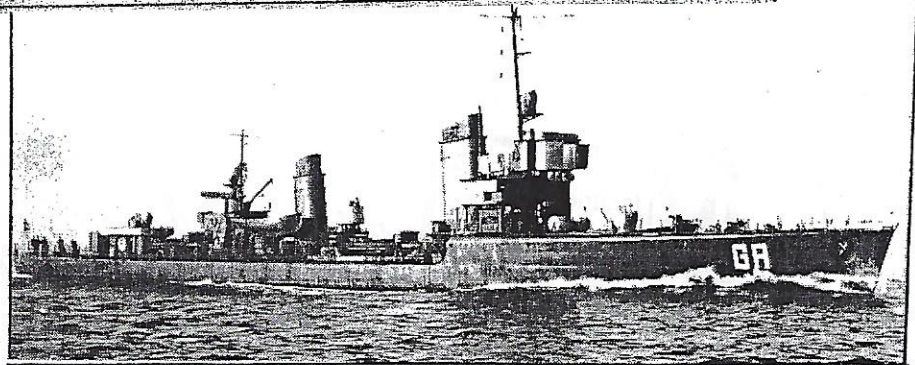
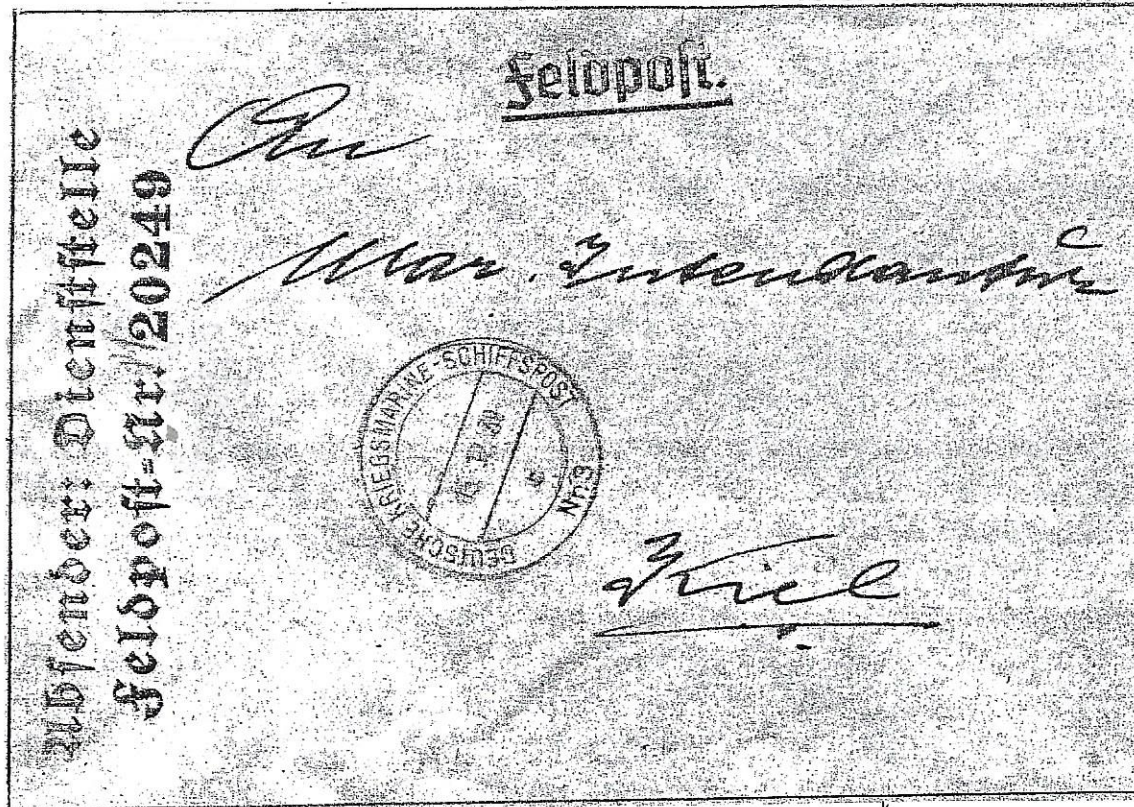

Torpedo Boat 'Falke' - Feldpost # 20249



Torpedo Boat type 1923 built by Naval Dockyard (Wilhelmshaven) and launched September 22, 1926. Displacement: 924 tons; speed: 33 knots; armament: three 4.1", two 20mm AA guns and six 21" torpedo tubes; crew: 122.

'Falke' acted as escort for part of the Channel dash of Prinz Eugen, Sarnhorst and Gneisenau in February 1942 and also acted as escort to commerce raiders. She escorted blockade breakers and U-boats in the dangerous waters of the Bay of Biscay early in 1943. She took part in an attack on the invasion fleet in June 1944 and was finally sunk at Le Havre on June 15, 1944.

Cover sent to Kiel on December 15, 1940 has old double-ring Deutsche Marine Schiffspost Nr. 3 cancel used by the 5th Torpedo Boat Flotilla.

From My Collection:

How a Normal Looking Feldpost Cover Became a Gem

Shown below is a regular letter with 12 Pfg. Hitler Head stamp sent by a Dr. Scheel in Salzburg to a soldier evidently home on leave in Krems. Determining that the soldier had returned to duty, the Krems P.O. added the notation "Bitte nachsenden" (Please forward) as it lacked the needed Feldpost number address. The letter went to the Vienna Feldpost Office where the clerks were able to supply Feldpost # 57729. It then went to the desk that had Part III of the Feldpostübersicht (Feldpost Directory) to add the correct Kenn number (K-191).

K-191 was assigned to FpA 236 of the 162nd Infantry Division that had begun training Ost (Eastern) battalions in the fall of 1942. This division was withdrawn from Russia to Slovenia on May 31, 1943 where it simultaneously conducted training and anti-partisan operations along the Ljubljana-Trieste Railroad. Fp.# 57729 was assigned to Truppenübungsplatz (Troop Training Grounds) Gross-Born where the division was training under German cadre with personnel largely from the ethnic tribes of southern Russia and Turkistan. In November 1943, Fp.# 57729 became the address of Militär-Kommandantur (Rear Area Command) 1010 in an area of northern Italy occupied by German forces after Italy's surrender. As Ost units of 162nd Infantry Division were judged unreliable for combat on the Eastern Front, they were used for anti-partisan operations in Rear Area Command 1010. This command was renamed Alpenvorland in 1944 and came under civil control. The division was disbanded about this time and its personnel used for occupation duties.



Michel 830: A Stamp to be Cancelled

One element of planned use of Michel 830, a 3 + 2 Rpf. stamp for assisting collectors of special cancellations, was quickly curtailed by wartime restrictions. The intention was to encourage collectors to submit copies of Mi. 830 at postal windows either loose or pasted on pieces of paper to receive special cancellations. The Reichspost hoped collectors would do this rather than use entire envelopes or post cards, thereby saving paper. The initial regulation, however, indicated that upon application the Reichsdruckerei (National Printing Works) would imprint copies of Mi 830 on envelopes and postal cards. [1]

Very soon, however, there were second thoughts about the proposed imprinting of envelopes and postal cards. Therefore, this portion of the earlier regulation was rescinded in late January 1943. [2]

This color post card has Mi. 830 tied by the Graz special cancellation commemorating the 10th Anniversary of Hitler's assumption of power on January 1, 1933.

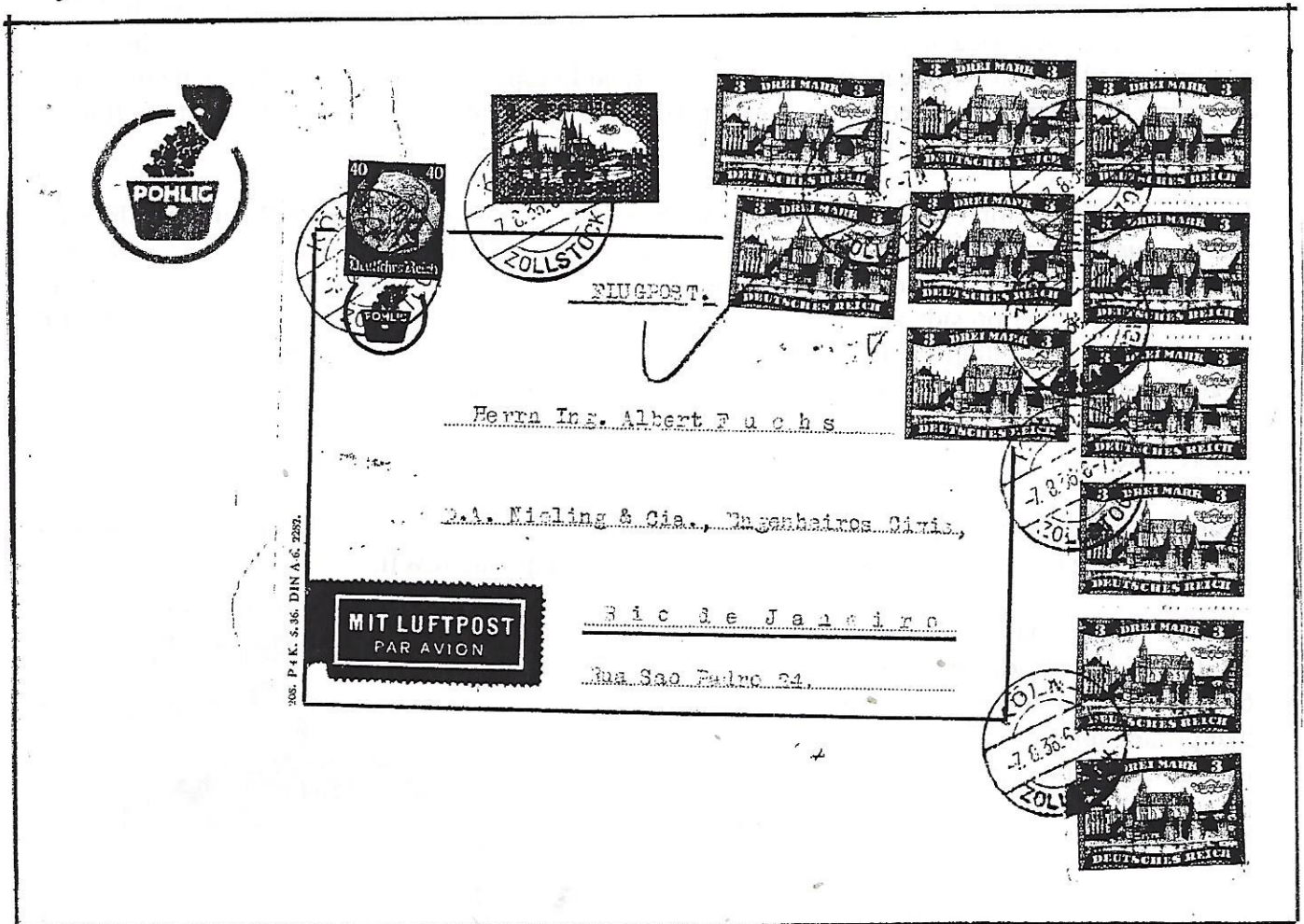


Weimar Republic Materials Used Between 1933 and 1945

Bob Ferguson introduced something new for our consideration in "Third Reich Vorlaufers" which appeared in the October 2005 issue of the TRSG Bulletin. Many of us doubtless have covers with Weimar Republic stamps used on or after January 30, 1933. At least in terms of postal affairs, there was undoubtedly a great deal of continuity between the Weimar Republic and the Third Reich and between the Third Reich and the post-WW II occupation zones. Focusing on the former provides new ways of looking at Nazi era philatelic pieces. In addition to adhesive stamps, a good many postal stationery items issued in the Weimar years survived into the Nazi era. In his 1984 catalog of printed-to-order postal cards, Hanspeter Frech identified several Weimar cards as Third Reich 'Vorlaufer' because they were changed slightly and sold again after Hitler's assumption of power. Weimar meter designs were frequently used until the end of the Third Reich and beyond. Weimar cash paid markings also continued into the Third Reich. Apparently no one thought it necessary to add swastikas to "Gebühr bezahlt" cancels or stamped markings. Cancellations of all kinds, including commemorative, plus registration and other labels carried over from the Weimar period.

Because many of the Weimar stamps are very attractive, I am enthusiastic about their use during the Nazi years. The Weimar eagle airmail stamps that were still valid in the 1930s, for example, have interesting delicate colors that display well on album pages. A good many covers of the 1930s with large amounts of postage paid carry Weimar rather than Nazi era stamps. Shown below is a commercial airmail cover to Rio de Janeiro posted at Cologne in August 1936. In addition to the eleven 3 mark stamps on the front, there is another eight on the reverse, which brings the total postage paid to nearly sixty marks.



Story Behind the Stamp: The Volkswagen

Sitting at a restaurant table in Munich in the summer of 1932, Hitler sketched the design for what would become the successful Beetle design for Volkswagen (literally the “car of the people”). In an era where only the most economic elite possessed cars, Hitler believed that all people should be able to own a car and thought that a smart design could allow for reliability, enjoyment and vacation travel.

In the summer of 1933 Ferdinand Porsche was summoned to the Hotel Kaiserdorf in Berlin for a meeting with Hitler. Porsche had an outstanding reputation as an engineer. He had been chief designer for Daimler-Benz, Auto-Union and now had his own engineering consultation firm. In a private conference, Hitler told the engineer his plans for a car. It should be small, perhaps a four-seater, have a good durable engine, get 40 miles per gallon and be air-cooled since most Germans did not have a garage. Porsche then asked for an idea of the price. With laughter Hitler answered, “At any price, Herr Doktor Porsche. Any price below 1,000 Marks!” Porsche paled, 1,000 Marks in 1933 was roughly equivalent to 250 dollars. Even Ford could not build that cheaply.

Less than a year later at the opening of the Berlin International Motor Show, Hitler promised the German public a small low-priced car. Then Porsche received an official order to have three prototype models ready within ten months. What Hitler didn’t know was that Porsche had already designed and built a small car. In 1932 he had produced rear-engine, air-cooled cars with square bodies. In 1935 Porsche visited America and toured General Motors, Ford and Packard assembly plants. The American system turned out cars in great quantity, something no European had ever done. When he returned to Germany he realized that German private capital could never finance this kind of operation. It would have to be done by the state.

Finally in 1936 the three prototypes were ready and Hitler announced at the 1937 Automobile Show that production would start soon. Robert Ley, head of the K.D.F. (Strength Through Joy) movement, was assigned to set up a factory. He ruthlessly appropriated a private estate in Wolfsburg, hired an architect, and Hitler presided at the cornerstone ceremony. What is most significant about the entire project is that Hitler didn’t really care if the car went into production. The Volkswagen was a political device, a sop to his public, whose support he desperately needed for his military adventures. Two months before the cornerstone ceremony, he had annexed Austria. Two days after the ceremony he ordered the invasion of Czechoslovakia, and eleven months after that, invaded Poland.

With war fully under way, the now completed factory at Wolfsburg produced Type 82 Kubelwagens, simple looking military vehicles that were Germany’s “Jeeps” in WWII.

The top value of the set of three stamps issued February 17, 1939 for the Berlin International Motor Show (Mi. 688) depicts the Volkswagen. This same stamp was overprinted for the Nürburgring Motor Races (Mi. 697) issued May 8, 1939 (shown at right).

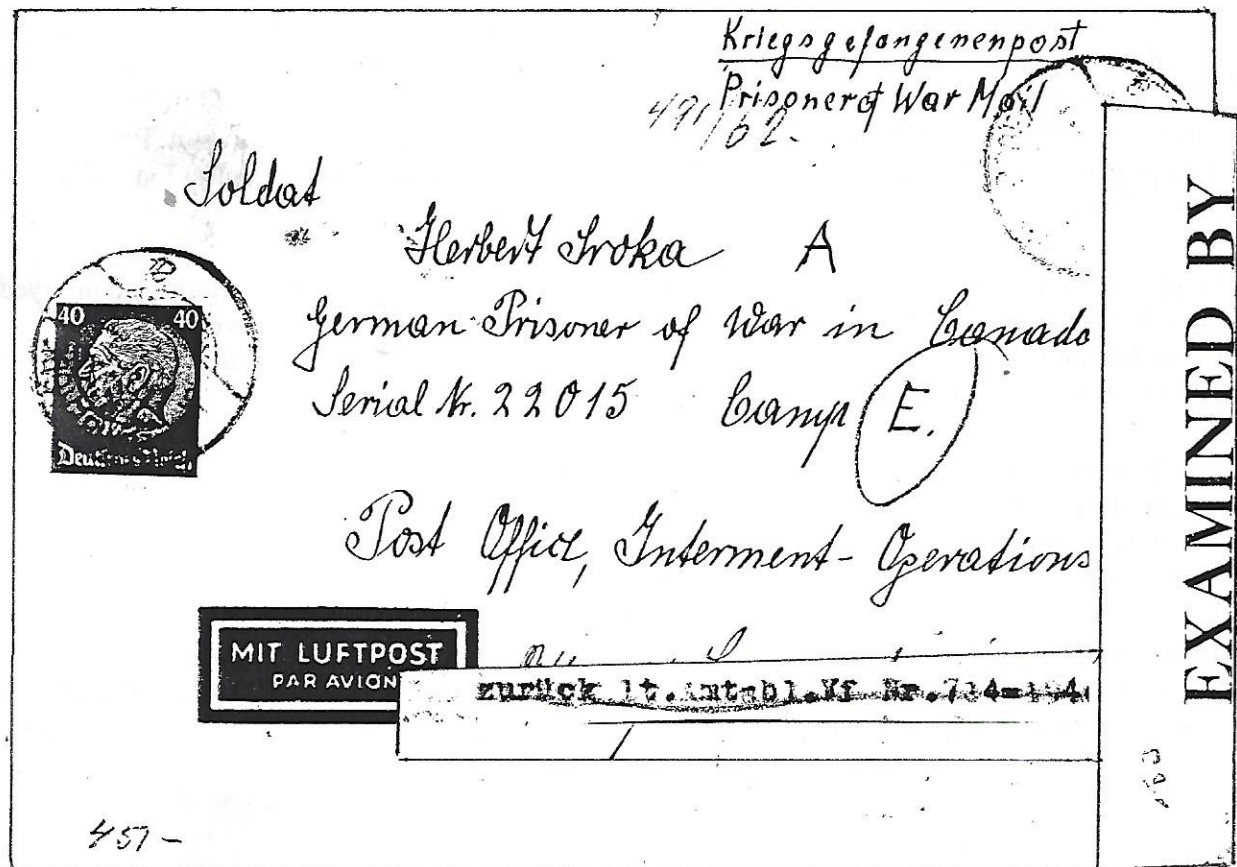


Rejected by Censor - Inadmissible Mail

Shown below is an airmail cover sent to a German soldier held in a Canadian POW Camp E that was initially returned by the Cologne Mail Examination Office. The provisional label notes a violation of Order 714 of the Amtsblatt for 1940. Apparently this problem was corrected as the label was voided and the letter forwarded to its destination as evidenced by the Canadian censor tape. The reverse side of this cover bears ordinary Cologne censorship hand stamps and sealing tape.



Fundamentals of Feldpost Collecting

Part 20. Feldpost Numbers of POW Units

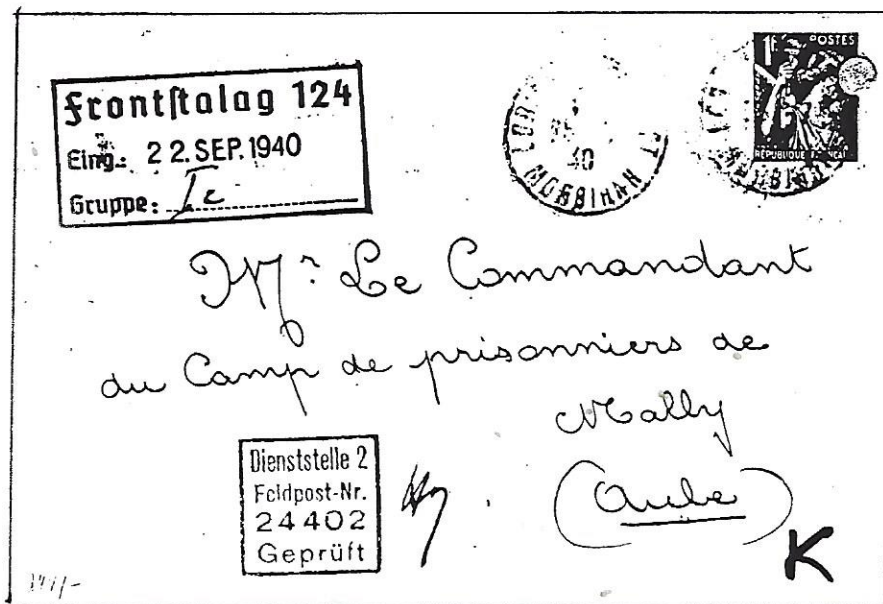
The purpose of this article is to provide a listing of Feldpost numbers used by military units that were part of the Prisoner of War system. Those units of the Replacement Army (**Ersatzheer**) responsible for guarding & housing POW camps located in military districts did not require Feldpost numbers, so mail from these camps displayed open identification. However, there were also camps in areas administered by the Field Army (**Feldheer**) and mail from these camps required Feldpost numbers return addresses.

A POW was initially sent to a camp located in the rear of the combat zone. These camps were initially designated "**Frontstalag**" but were changed to "**Durchgangslager**" or "**Dulag**" early in 1942. Camps established during the French campaign of 1940 were numbered in the 100 & 200 series while the 300 series was established in 1941 during the Russian campaign. Prisoners were then processed at a POW Collection Office (**Kriegsgefangenen Sammelstelle**) located at Army level and then sent to permanent POW camps in the Reich.

Feldpost numbers were also assigned to units that supervised POW work battalions employed outside the camps that were designated by their activities. These activities were primarily Labor (**Arbeits**) or Construction (**Bau**), but there were also specialized Roofer (**Dachdecker**) and Glazier (**Glaser**) battalions.

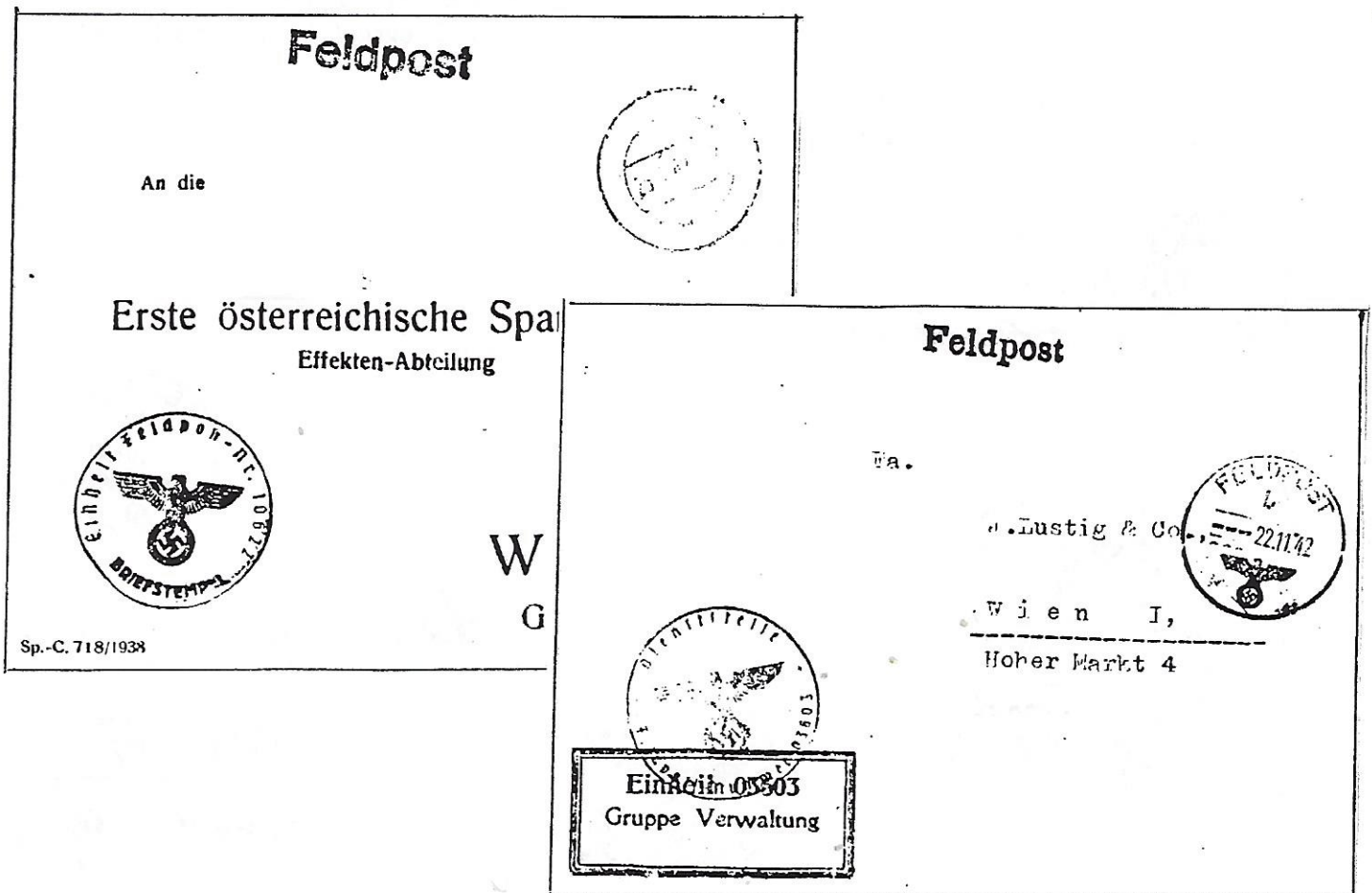
The following incorporates a listing initially published as "Deutsche Kriegsgefangeneneinrichtungen im Zweiten Weltkrieg und ihre Feldpostnummern" in Rundbrief 35/1982 of the "Arbeitsgemeinschaft Zensurpost". Addition Feldpost numbers and all illustrations were added by the TRSG.

This early cover (Fig. 1) indicates some confusion regarding the proper return address. Dispatched in September 1940 by a civil post office in France, the cover has "**Frontstalag 124**" at top left corner plus a censor stamp with "**Geprüft**" and Fp. # 24402, the coded address for Frontstalag 124.



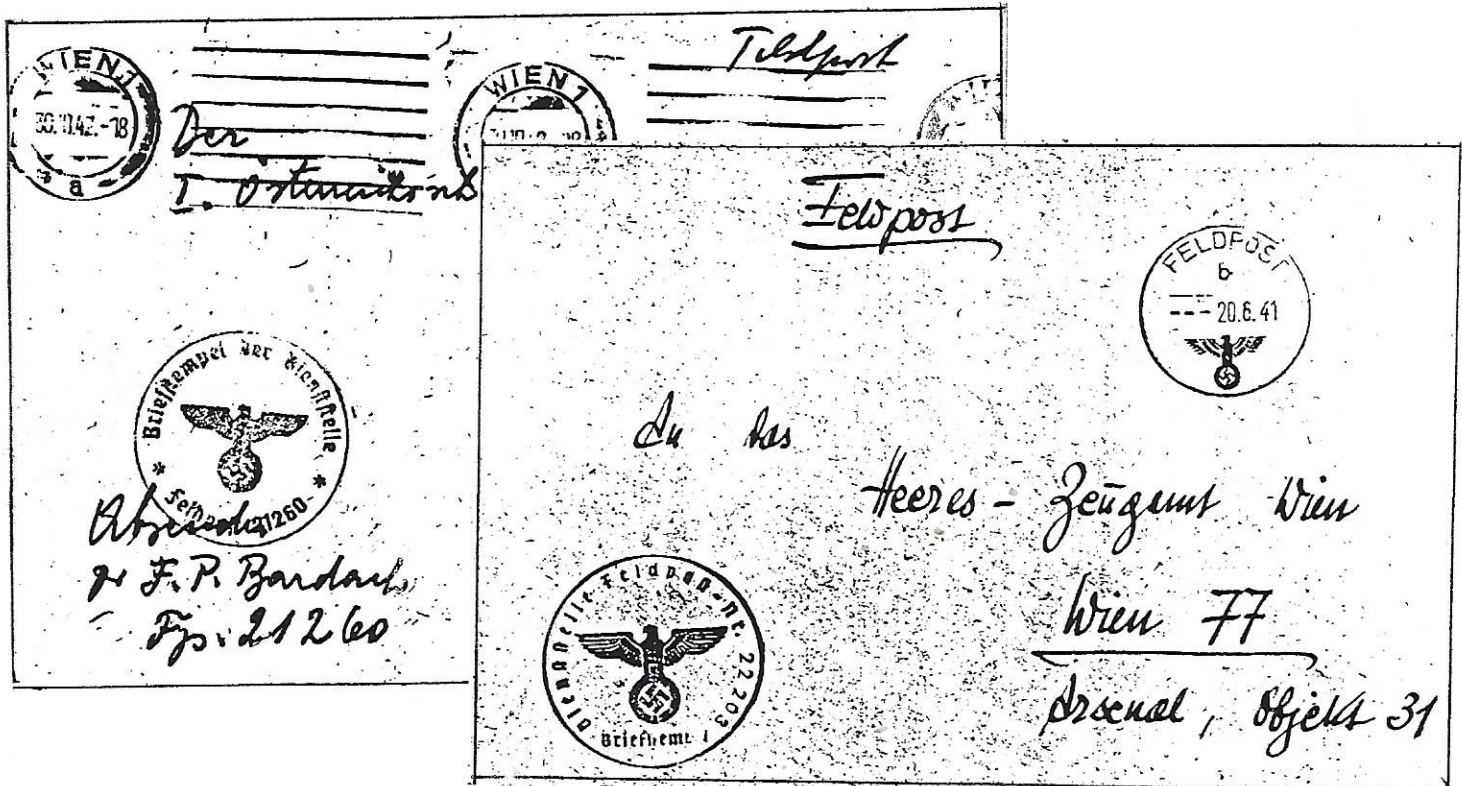

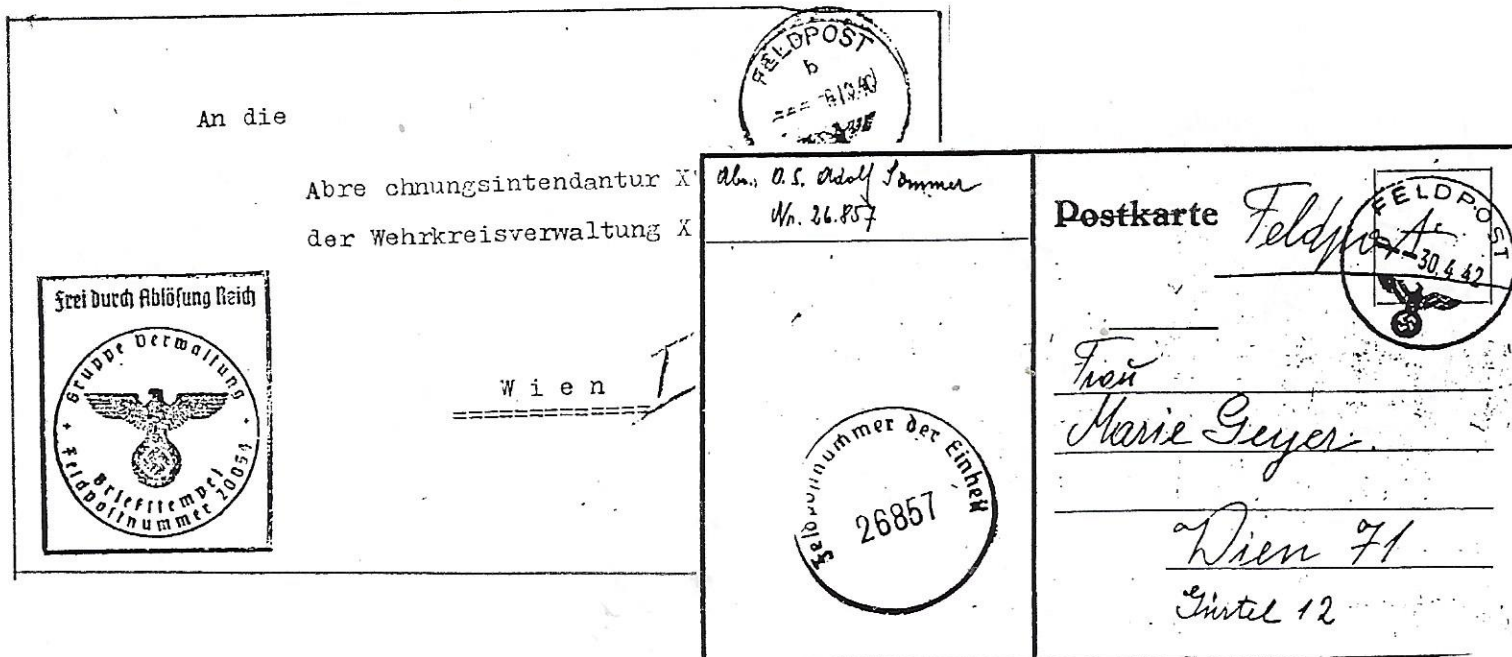

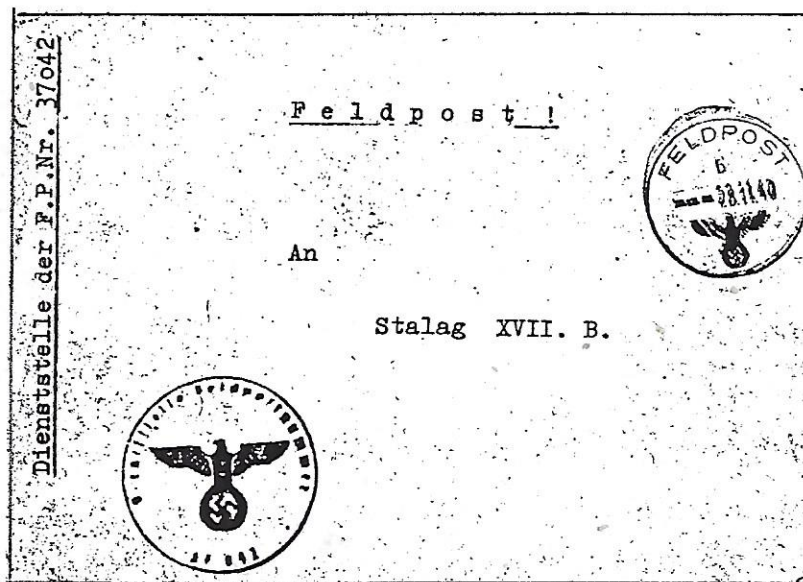

The 251st Infantry Division was formed in the summer of 1939 (4th Wave) from men serving in reserve (Ergänzungs) units. The P.O was assigned Fp.# 30679 as a return address and Kenn 160 as a coded identification in lieu of Tactical FpA 251. In the spring of 1940, the division took part in the drive through Belgium with Army Group B.

The division was then sent to the central sector of the Eastern Front in July 1941 and took part in the drive on Moscow (1941), the defensive battles (1942), the Rzhev withdrawal, the Battle of Kursk and the middle Dneiper withdrawal (1943). The 251st Infantry Division was virtually annihilated during the massive Soviet summer offensive against Army Group Center in June 1944.

The remnants of the division were withdrawn in September 1944 and reformed as the 251st Volksgrenadier Division. This reformed division was sent back into action in eastern Germany, where it opposed the Red Army's drive through Pomerania. During the latter stages of the war it was part of Army Group Vistula during the Berlin campaign and surrendered to the Soviets at the end of the war.

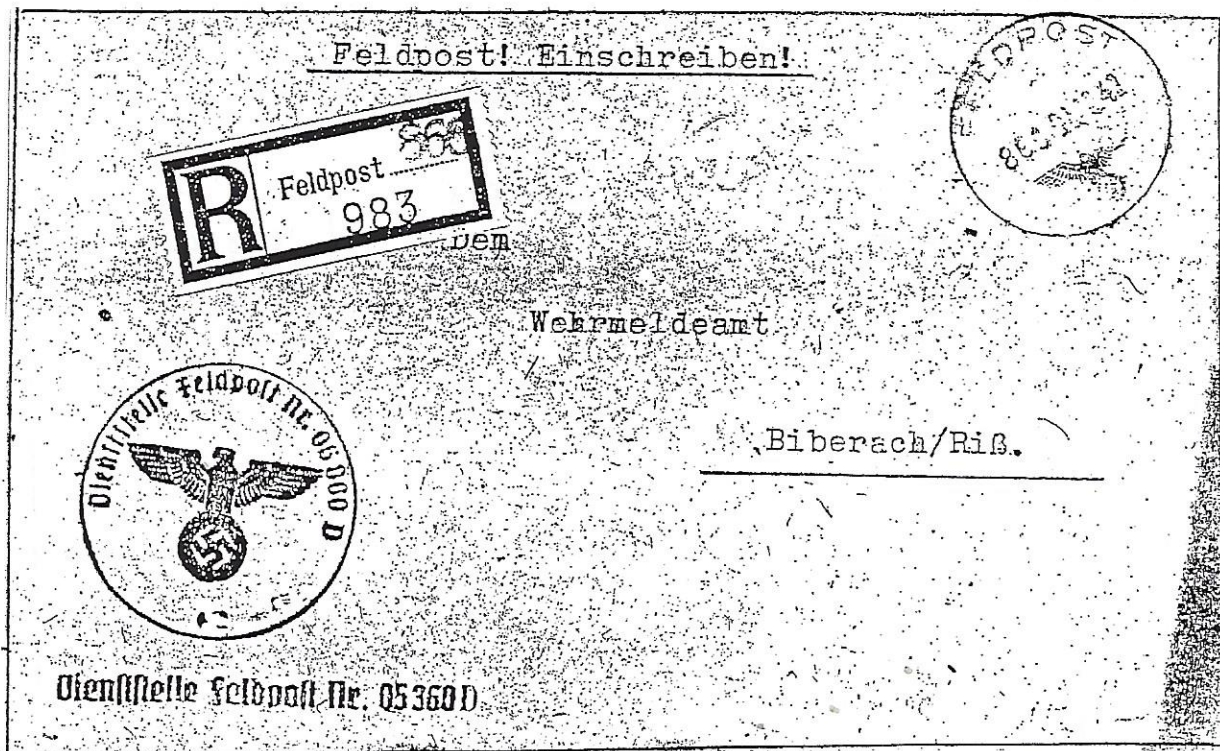

The 305th Infantry Division was formed in late 1940 (13th Wave) and remained in Germany until mid-1941, when it was posted to western France. The P.O. was assigned Fp.# 43340 as a return address and Kenn 866 for use on registered mail in lieu of tactical FpA 305. It was then sent to the southern sector of the Russian Front in May 1942 and took part in the 6th Army's advance to Kharkov, Izyum, Voronezh, Kalach and Stalingrad. Along with most of the 6th Army, it was surrounded and destroyed at Stalingrad in January 1943.

A second 305th Infantry Division was formed in France in May 1943 and posted to Nice on the Mediterranean to replace the unreliable Italian 4th Army. A new FpA 305 was assigned Fp.# 45406 and Kenn 239. It entered Italy with Rommel's Army Group B in late summer 1943 and by the latter part of the year was in action in southern Italy. The division suffered heavy casualties south of Rome and was briefly withdrawn to the rear where it received replacements from the 9th Infantry Division. It soon returned to action but by that summer was again withdrawn to the north to rest and refit. Back on the front line in the autumn, it fought in the Rimini-Cessna area in October. The 305th Infantry Division was fighting west of Bologna in January 1945 and ended the war on the Italian Front.

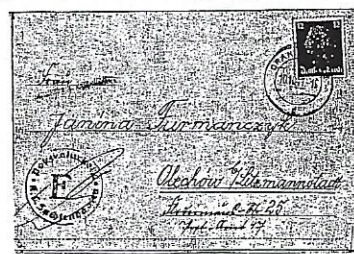
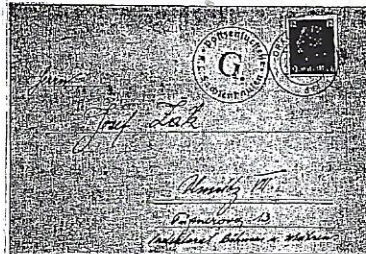
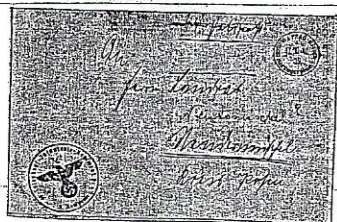
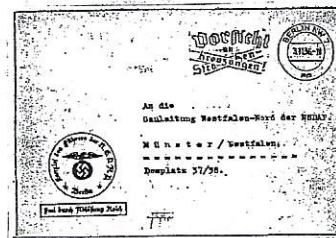
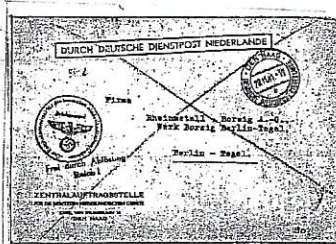
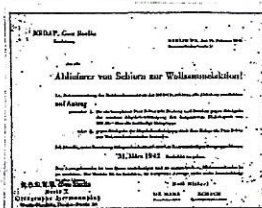
