Camps in Poland
TRSG member Z.H. Stankiewicz has a book entitled "Obozy hitlerowskie na ziemiach polskich 1939-1945" which is in Polish and printed in Warsaw, 1979. This was published by "The Central Commission for Examination of Crimes Committed Under Hitler's Rule in Poland" and the title in English reads "Hitler's Camps on Polish Territory 1939-1945". The book is in encyclopedia form, has over 600 pages and lists 5877 camps which include POW, ghetto, police detention centers, M.P. detention centers, K.Z. camps, forced labor camps, detention centers for people awaiting court trials, etc. Also included are 4 large (3' x 4') maps showing the primary camps (these are in color and not readable in an 8" x 10" reproduction). A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE THIRD REICH STUDY GROUP

During a recent TRSG staff meeting, someone observed that our group is nearing it's 20th anniversary. Given the high failure rate for most new publications, particularly those dealing with philately, we should all be justifiably proud that our Bulletin has stood the test of time and has made significant contributions in furthuring an understanding of the postal history of this turbulent era. What follows is a brief history of the TRSG which we hope will both prove interesting to the membership and inspire most of you to become more active in contributing information for the Bulletin to insure our continued success.

Our history begins in 1961 when Herbert G. Schultz, one-time president of the GPS, suggested to Ben R. Beede that a new study group be formed for those GPS members interested in the Third Reich era. By January, 1963 Ben Beede and John Painter, as co-directors of the new group, published the first TRSG Bulletin. A second Bulletin appearing in April '63 listed 26 members (6 of whom are still active members).

While these early Bulletins appeared four times a year, they usually were only a few pages long and had no illustrations (the Xerox machine not as readily available as today). Their importance was the quality of the writing and the research into Feldpost which culminated many years later in "Project Himmelblau". In 1965 Ben and Jack began a collaboration with Roger Szymanski and Alf Harper to produce a postal history of Germany's foreign legions. These efforts resulted in a six part article appearing in the German Postal Specialist in 1968.

The TRSG staff was increased in late 1968. Robert Houston became Secretary-Treasurer and Myron Fox became Information Bureau chief. In 1969, Jack Painter resigned as Director and James E. Duffy became Bulletin editor. Under this new team the Bulletins became longer and by #20 in July '70, illustrations were introduced.

After countless contributions over the years, Ben Beede found that personal committments compelled his resignation as Director. Myron Fox and Jim Duffy agreed to serve as Co-Directors with Jim also acting as Editor. Bob Houston continued as Secretary-Treasurer. Under this new leadership the first Special publication, Petersen's Feldpost Cancel Guide appeared in 1970. Another innovation was introduced with Bulletin #33 in 1973. For many years Fred Stengle had proposed a TRSG Auction and finally got the chance to test his idea with an action consisting of 42 lots. The success of this first action earned Fred the job as Auction Manager. Over the years the TRSG auction continues in popularity and has been the prime source for varied and fairly priced material.

The difficulty of coordinating Bulletin preparation by members located far apart was solved by a new staff formed in 1977. The "New Jersey Gau" consists of Bob Houston as Editor, Jim Lewis as Associate Editor, Fred Willshaw as Data Projects Specialist and Fred Stengel as Auction Manager. Jim Duffy and Myron Fox continue to serve as Co-Directors.

While the present staff arrangement has solved the "logistics" problems which formerly made production of the TRSG Bulletin a one-man job, the continued growth of our group is dependent upon all of our members to contribute articles, ideas, even criticisms which will improve our format or contents. To those many members who have supplied information for the Bulletin, many thanks. To those who have not, we do ask that you make an effort to participate by sharing your material and/or knowledge with your fellow members. That is, after all, the way in which a "Study Group" is supposed to work.

THE ITALIAN SOCIALIST REPUBLIC by Jim Lewis

The "Repubblica Sociale Italiana" was established by Mussolini in Sept. 1943 following his release from captivity. This new fascist government had authority over the area of northern Italy occupied by German forces excepting the Alpine provinces which had been annexed by the Reich (See TRSG Bulletin 61 - p.11).

Supplies of Italian stamps were quickly overprinted to denote the new state. By November '43 the first new issues of stamps and postal stationery were placed on sale.

Of particular interest to TRSG members is mail sent from this fascist state to foreign territories as such mail was subject to German censorship, being routed through the Munich Censor office or it's branch in Milan.

The following illustrate the varied and interesting postal markings which may be found on mail from this short-lived "republic".




Fig. 2) Registered cover to Red Cross posted Pescarenico Jan. 23,'45 with Italian censor label/h'stamp on rear, German tape and handstamps on left side.




Fig. 3) Overprinted stamps on surface rate cover from Strembo to Vienna posted June '44. This item not examined by Italian censors. Embossed German sealing tape has scarce green "Ad" machine stamp (Reimer D-22).




Fig. 5) Registered express cover sent from Savona to Red Cross in Geneva July 44 has Munich censor tape & handstamp.

In February '44, the 80,000 series of German feldpost numbers were assigned exclusively to Italian units, including postage free mail to and from such units. As postal communications deteriorated during the last months of the war, such mail sent from Italy was often sent back as undeliverable, adding additional markings in the form of hand stamps or labels applied by the Reichspost or Feldpost.




Fig. 6) Postal card sent March'45 from Verona to Italian w/Fp# 80271 (Organization Todt Einheit Hoffman) in Germany via the German Feldpost.




Fig. 7) Postcard w/ 20 Cent. added postage addressed to "Soldato" at Fp#L30217 via LGPA Munich stamped "Züruck" (Return) w/notation that the address is incorrect. (This Fp# was Stab II/Eisb. Pi. Rgt. 4 - not a Luftwaffe unit.) While cancel is indistinct, boxed h'stamp shows that this card returned April 6,'45.

AN INTRODUCTION TO POLISH POW CAMP POST by Chris Kulpinski

The defeat of the Polish Armed Forces during the early days of World War II resulted in the imprisonment of many Polish officers in several Officer Prisoner of War Camps (Offizierlager or Oflag for short) in Germany.

After many months, while the organizational process was taking place, a number of social, cultural, professional and athletic groups were formed to fill the aimless days and months of prison life. In the larger Oflags, internal postal systems were developed. The four Oflags which developed postal systems were Woldenberg (IIC), Murnau (VIIA), Gross Born (IID) and Neubrandenburg (IIE/K).

The first internal postal system was developed at Woldenburg as a means of raising contributions to the Widow and Orphans Fund, which sent money back to Poland through the Red Cross. As a one-time effort, Easter greetings would be transmitted through the established postal system for a fee. This idea was first approved by the Polish Elder of the camp and then by the German camp authorities.

To show payment, two stamps were designed and engraved onto a piece of wood. The 10 F design depicts a widow and child at a grave site (Fig. 1), an appropriate theme for the Widow and Orphans Fund whose initials FWS (Fundusz Wdow i Sierot) appears in the upper right corner of the stamp. There were 11,930 of the 10 F stamps printed in five colors - blue, red, green, brown and black on various types of paper. Obviously, there are numerous color and shade varieties.

The second stamp sold for 20 F and carried the design of a postman (Fig. 2) with a stylized FWS in the upper left corner. This value was issued only in red with a printing of 1087 stamps.

Although Easter fell on April 5, 1942, the official beginning of the Woldenburg internal postal system was May 7, 1942. The Easter post was a huge success with 8,000 pieces of mail handled by the system. The Widow and Orphans Committee requested permission to extend the service permanent ly. This request was granted and a postal committee was formed. As noted, the internal postal system was formally introduced on May 7, 1942 and continued in operation until January 25, 1945, shortly before the camp was evacuated. During it's lifetime, the system served the needs of over 7,000 prisoners as well as raising funds for the library, barter store, theater group, athletic clubs and other social or cultural groups.

When news of the Woldenberg postal activities reached Oflag VIIA at Murnau, a committee was formed and approval sought to initiate a similar system to assist the fund which collected monies to be sent back to Poland. With approval by both the Polish and German camp authorities, an internal postal system began operations at Murnau on November 6, 1942. The first stamp issue was a general view of the camp, looking south toward the Bavarian Alps (Fig. 3). This stamp is known as the "Onion" because of the onion-shaped cupola atop the clock tower in the center of the camp. In fact, all of the Murnau stamps are camp related. In contrast, Woldenberg stamp designs are primarily of a historical or religious nature.

Murnau is an interesting camp to study since all of it's material has been forged. Unlike the other camps, postal authorities at Murnau did not invalidate the woodcuts used in the printing of stamps (Fig. 4). These woodcuts were subsequently used to reprint the stamps after the war. Various other forgeries have been produced from new woodcuts. As in the case with all such material, the informed collector can find his way through the maze. Most forgeries are easy to spot (Fig. 5) if one is familiar with the original.

Postal activities ended at Murnau on April 28, 1945 when the camp was liberated by the American Army.




Fig. 6) The "Chapel" envelope

Postal activities were not as extensive at Gross Born or Neubrandenburg. Neubrandenburg's postal system existed for six months, from January 22, 1943 until June 22, 1943 at which time the camp was merged with Gross Born. The postal systems of both camps were naturally consolidated. The postal authorities at Neubrandenburg issued only eight stamps (total printing of 12,248), one piece of postal stationery (250 printed) and two post cards (6,648 printed). The postal stationery (Fig. 6) has the same design as the first stamp, an outdoor chapel built by the prisoners from stone blocks found at the camp.

Gross Born's postal activities began December 3, 1943. The first stamp depicted a carrier pigeon (Fig. 7). Funds from the sale of stamps were used for the welfare of the prisoners. This camp was very active philatelically. Twenty-eight varieties of stamps were issued as well as a postage due stamp and sixteen post card varieties.

The intra-camp postal system at Gross Born was disbanded when the camp was evacuated on January 25, 1945.

Due to the difficulty in finding larger pieces of paper and because of the waste involved, the use of printed envelopes was quickly discontinued.

The fact that these camp postal systems existed is not surprizing, but the fact that they functioned so well is quite amazing. Considering the hardships and shortcomings of German POW camps, the quality of work produced by these men is truley magnificent. First, there was the lack of paper. The Red Cross eventually supplied small amounts of paper which was carefully measured to allow as little waste as possible. Inks were made from artists paints as well as house paints thinned with linseed oil. Several stamps were produced with printer's ink which found it's way into the camps in late 1944. Glue was homemade and applied to the stamp when it was affixed to a card or letter. At Gross Born the sheet was gummed after the stamps had been printed. Oflag VIIA located some commercially gummed paper from an ex-Panzer HQ in nearby Murnau. This paper had originally been intended for use in creating theatrical props. Generally, most stamps were ungummed and the lack of glue is one more reason why there was so little postal stationery produced in the camps.

These stamps were produced one at a time from "plates" which had been carved into hardwood by hand. As noted earlier, at the completion of a printing, the woodcuts were invalidated by cutting a line through the design (Fig. 4 shows the invalidated design of the first Woldenburg issue).

The printing of stamps and accounting of funds from their sale was the task of the postal commissions which operated in all four camps. The records of stamp production and revenue were kept secret from the German camp authorities, since the prisoners did not want their captors to know the substancial amounts of money generated through these activities and sent back to Poland.

It is obvious that the entire subject of Polish POW post cannot be covered in such a short article. However, I hope I have provided at least some basic knowledge on the manner in which these stamps came to be. Although some purists dismiss these stamps, they are nevertheless an integral part of both Polish and German postal history. At the very least they are legitimate "local" issues, having been authorized by local authorities. The listing and valuation of these stamps in both the Michel and Ruch catalogs indicates that they are accepted by the collectors of both Polish and German material.

AUSLANDS-ORGANISATION CARD

As a follow-up to Jim Lewis' article in TRSG Bulletin 63 (p.13), the propaganda card shown below commemorates Expatriate Germans' Day and the National Coference held in Stuttgart. Superimposed on the map of Germany are the words of Friedrich Hölderlin: "Oh Sacred Spirit of the Folk, Oh Fatherland!". The address side of this card (Bernhard 163) describes Hölderlin as a poet of German idealism who was born 1770 in Lauffen am Nechar and died 1843 in Tübingen. Although the card carries no indication of the printer, the lower right corner of the picture side indicates that the artist was Lehner of Tübingen.




II.) Ring/segment/date bridge

The "Kreisbrücke" cancel is the second most common "stumme" type, existing in both hand and roller style. The majority of these cancels measure 26/15/9 mm and are found with combinations of letters, numbers and asteriks. Those with asteriks are noted by Clement as having been used in occupied Poland.



- Fig. 8) An early item, this cover sent by member of Abt.III/Flak Rgt. 36 in Sept.'39 has openly identified unit seal. A handstamp was applied by sub-postoffice Wolfenbüttel B and forwarded to a larger P.O. which used a "stumme" cancel. Such confusion regarding the proper use of "stumme" cancels was not uncommon during the early months of the war.
- Fig. 9) Proper use of a "stumme" cancel on cover sent from Fp.# 27011 (HQ/Searchlight Btl. 369). Lacking any "code" markings in lower portion of cancel, it is impossible to identify the originating post office.





III.) Circle cancels

Four size "Kreis" cancels are listed by Clement, 21/0/0, 23/0/0, 24/0/0 and 28/0/0 mm. These cancels are found with various letters, numerals & asteriks, several machine types with straight lines, wavy lines and slogans.





Fig. 16) A 21mm machine cancel w/slogan "Ein/Postsparbuch/bietet viele Vorteile!" on an official Naval cover is listed by Clements as used in Kiel.


Fig. 17) Small cover with 21mm machine cancel w/7 straight lines to right sent Dec. 40 from Fp# 10261 (I/Inf. Rgt. 462 of 262 Inf. Div.)



Propaganda Card Corner


Two similar multi-color double cards sent in by TRSGer John Ziegelhofer were part of the German propaganda campaign concerning the Danzig corridor (see TRSG # 62 - p.20).

Both of these cards have the same view of the "Vistula Corridor" on one half. The designer may have been "Kumples" as this name appears in the lower right corner. The other half of one card is obviously aimed at a British audience while the other card is aimed at American readers.

The reverse side of both the British and American cards is identical and is shown below with the British version. One half of the reverse is blank while the other half has standard address lines and "POST-CARD" in English.







Fig. 2) Shown below is the American version of the Danzig card.




Another pre-war item showing "All of Germany within the operating areas of enemy planes: (RJH)



OFFICIAL U.S. MAIL TO GERMANY VIA LISBON by Jim Lewis

The cover shown below is a scarce example of official U.S. mail sent to Germany during the war years. Examination of the postal markings show that the cover was sent by a member of the U.S. Legation in Lisbon, Portugal in Jan. '44. A cellopane sealing tape is tied by a U.S. censor handstamp inscribed "Examined by 630". Traces of adhesive in the upper right corner indicate that two stamps had been affixed. There is no sign that these stamps had been cancelled as the Lisbon cancels of this period were generally large and used greasy ink.

The back of the cover has a sealing label & handstamp of the Berlin censor office (code "b"). As surface mail between Lisbon and German territories was handled by the Munich censor office (code "d"), the cover probably arrived in Berlin by air transport. As postal communication between these two countries was possible only through the Red Cross, why did the German postal censors not reject this letter? The lack of a cancellation and the routing might indicate that the letter was conveyed in the diplomatic pouch of a neutral country (Portugal?). Finally, what was the "Official American Group" being held in detention at Baden-Baden? Any information on this routing will be appreciated.
